Before measuring any hazardous voltage or current, remove all test leads to the instrument, run the TEST:ALL? query from the remote interface, and read the result to verify that the instrument is performing properly.

The TEST:ALL? query is a self-test that returns +0 if the instrument passes and +1 if the instrument fails. You can also perform this query from the front panel by pressing [Shift] > [Utility] > Test/Admin > Self Test > Full Test. If this self-test fails, make sure that the instrument is repaired and passes the complete self-test before continuing.

### **WARNING** Measuring AC Power Mains

The HI, LO, and current input terminals may be connected to AC mains power in IEC Category II installations for line voltages up to 300 VAC. To avoid the danger of electric shock, do not connect the inputs to AC mains power for line voltages above 300 VAC. See IEC Measurement Category II for further information.

#### **WARNING** Measuring Current with A Current Transformer

If a current transformer is used for measuring current, you must use a current transformer with internal secondary protection. 



It is designed to operate at a maximum relative humidity of 5% to 80% at 40 °C or less (non-condensing). This instrument or system is designed to operate at altitudes up to 3000 meters, and at temperatures between 0 and 55 °C.

#### Measurement Limits


The Truevolt Series DMMs provide protection circuitry to prevent damage to the instrument and to protect against the danger of electric shock, provided the Measurement Limits are not exceeded. To ensure safe operation of the instrument, do not exceed the Measurement Limits shown on the front and rear panel, and defined as follows:







34461A, 34465A, 34470A Front Panel Terminal Area



34461A, 34465A, 34470A Rear Panel Terminal Area

For the 34461A, 34465A, and 34470A, the Front/Rear switch selects the terminal set to be used. DO NOT operate this switch while signals are present on the front or rear terminals.

The user-replaceable 3 A current-protection fuse is on the rear panel. There are 3 A and 10 A (34461A, 34465A and 34470A) current-protection fuses located inside the unit. Contact your Keysight Sales and Service Center or refer to product service documentation for replacement instructions.

To maintain protection, replace fuses only with fuses of the specified type and rating.

### Input Terminal Measurement Limits

Measurement Limits are defined for the input terminals:

Main Input (HI and LO) Terminals. The HI and LO input terminals are used for voltage, resistance, frequency (period), capacitance, and diode test measurements. Two Measurement Limits are defined for these terminals:

- HI to LO Measurement Limit. The Measurement Limit from HI to LO (Input terminals) is 1000 VDC or 750 VAC, which is also the maximum voltage measurement. This limit can also be expressed as 1000 Vpk maximum.
- LO to Ground Measurement Limit. The LO input terminal can safely "float" a maximum of 500 Vpk relative to ground, where ground is defined as the Protective Earth Conductor in the AC mains power cord connected to the instrument.

As implied by the above limits, the Measurement Limit for the HI input terminal is a maximum of 1500 Vpk relative to ground when LO is at its maximum of 500 Vpk relative to ground.

**Current Input Terminal.** The current input ("I") terminal has a Measurement Limit of 3 A or 10 A (DC or AC) between the "I" terminal (3 A or 10 A) and the LO input terminal. Note that the current input terminals will always be at approximately the same voltage as the LO terminal, unless a current protection fuse is open. The 10 A terminal is not available on the 34460A.

#### Sense Terminal Measurement Limits

The HI and LO sense terminals are used for DCV ratio measurements and four-wire resistance and temperature measurements. The Measurement Limit is 200 Vpk for all of the terminal pairings: LO sense to LO input, HI sense to LO input, and HI sense to LO sense.

The 200 Vpk limit on the sense terminals is the Measurement Limit. Operational voltages in resistance measurements are much lower – up to  $\pm$  12 V in normal operation.

### IEC Measurement Category II

To protect against the danger of electric shock, the Keysight True*volt* Series DMM protects the user from AC mains power overvoltage events. When measuring AC mains, the HI and LO input terminals may be connected to AC mains power up to 300 VAC under Measurement Category II conditions as defined below.

IEC Measurement Category II includes electrical devices connected to AC mains power at an outlet on a branch circuit. Such devices include most small appliances, test equipment, and other devices that plug into a branch outlet or socket. The instrument may be used to make measurements with the HI and LO inputs connected to AC mains power in such devices, or to the branch outlet itself (up to 300 VAC). However, the instrument may not be used with its HI and LO inputs connected to AC mains power in permanently installed electrical devices such as the main circuit-breaker panel, sub-panel disconnect boxes, or permanently wired motors. Such devices and circuits are subject to overvoltages that may exceed the instrument's protection capabilities.

Voltages above 300 VAC may be measured only in circuits that are isolated from AC mains power. However, transient overvoltages are also present on circuits that are isolated from AC mains power. The instrument is designed to safely withstand occasional transient overvoltages up to 1500 Vpk when measuring voltages greater than 300 VAC. Do not use this equipment to measure circuits where transient overvoltages could exceed this level.

### Remote Interface Configuration

If you have the security option installed on your instrument, the instrument must be unsecured with the security code to perform many of these actions.

The instrument supports remote interface communication over three interfaces: GPIB (optional), USB, and LAN (optional on 34460A). All three are "live" at power up when the instrument ships from the factory.

- GPIB Interface: Set the instrument's GPIB address and connect to your PC using a GPIB cable.
- USB Interface: Use the rear-panel USB connector to communicate with your PC. For details, see USB Settings.
- LAN Interface: By default, DHCP is on, which may enable communication over LAN. The acronym DHCP stands for Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol, a protocol for assigning dynamic IP addresses to networked devices. With dynamic addressing, a device can have a different IP address every time it connects to the network.

### Connectivity Software

• The instrument ships with the **Keysight Automation-Ready CD**. This CD contains Keysight IO Libraries Suite software, which must be installed to enable remote-interface operations. The CD auto-starts and provides information on installing the software. Also includes *Keysight Technologies USB/LAN/GPIB Connectivity Guide*, which contains additional information.

### **GPIB** Configuration

Each device on the GPIB (IEEE-488) interface must have a unique whole number address between 0 and 30. The instrument ships with a default address of 10, and the GPIB address is displayed at power-on.

- This setting is non-volatile; it will not be changed by power cycling or \*RST or SYSTem:PRESet.
- Your computer's GPIB interface card address must not conflict with any instrument on the interface bus.
- Front Panel: Press [Utility] > I/O Config > GPIB Settings. From this menu, you can set the GPIB address and turn GPIB on or off. After making changes, you must cycle power on the instrument for the change to take effect.
- SCPI:

SYSTem:COMMunicate:GPIB:ADDRess < address > SYSTem:COMMunicate:ENABle {ON|1|OFF|0},GPIB

### LAN Configuration

The following sections describe the primary front panel LAN configuration functions, including SCPI commands where applicable. Some LAN configuration functions can be performed only via SCPI. See SYSTem Subsystem - I/O Configuration for all LAN configuration commands, and see LAN Configuration Procedure to configure the LAN via the front panel.

NOTE

Some LAN settings require you to cycle instrument power to activate them. The instrument briefly displays a message when this is the case, so watch the screen closely as you change LAN settings.

#### Resetting the LAN

You can clear the Web Interface password, turn DHCP on, and restart the LAN at any time:

Front Panel:[Utility] > I/O Config > LAN Reset

The message "Performing LAN Reset" is displayed while the LAN is reset.

• SCPI: LXI:RESet

#### DHCP On/Off

DHCP (Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol) can automatically assign a dynamic IP address to a LAN device. This is typically the easiest way to configure the instrument for LAN.

- This setting is non-volatile; it will not be changed by power cycling or \*RST or SYSTem:PRESet.
- Front Panel:[Utility] > I/O Config > LAN Settings > Modify Settings

  Then set the first softkey to DHCP to use DHCP to automatically assign an IP address.
- SCPI: SYSTem:COMMunicate:LAN:DHCP {ON|1|0FF|0}
- If you change this parameter, you must either press the Apply Changes softkey (front panel) or send SYSTem:COMMunicate:LAN:UPDate (remote interface) for the change to take effect.

To manually set an IP address, Subnet Mask, or Default Gateway, turn DHCP off, then change the IP setup as described below.

#### IP Address

You can enter a static IP address for the instrument as a four-byte integer expressed in dot notation. Each byte is a decimal value, with no leading zeros (for example, 169.254.2.20).

- If DHCP is on, it attempts to assign an IP address to the instrument. If it fails, Auto-IP attempts to assign an IP address to the instrument.
- Contact your LAN administrator to obtain an IP address.
- This setting is non-volatile; it will not be changed by power cycling or \*RST or SYSTem:PRESet.
- Front Panel:[Utility] > I/O Config > LAN Settings > Modify Settings
   Then set the first softkey to Manual and press IP Address to enter a new IP address.
- SCPI: SYSTem:COMMunicate:LAN:IPADdress "<address>"
- If you change this parameter, you must either press the **Apply Changes** softkey (front panel) or send SYSTem:COMMunicate:LAN:UPDate (remote interface) for the change to take effect.

#### Subnet Mask

Subnetting allows the LAN administrator to subdivide a network to simplify administration and minimize network traffic. The subnet mask indicates the portion of the host address used to indicate the subnet.

- Contact your LAN administrator for details.
- This setting is non-volatile; it will not be changed by power cycling or \*RST or SYSTem:PRESet.
- Front Panel:[Utility] > I/O Config > LAN Settings > Modify Settings
   Then set the first softkey to Manual and press Subnet Mask to enter a new subnet mask with the arrow keys (for example: 255.255.0.0).
- SCPI: SYSTem:COMMunicate:LAN:SMASk "<mask>"
- If you change this parameter, you must either press the **Apply Changes** softkey (front panel) or send SYSTem:COMMunicate:LAN:UPDate (remote interface) for the change to take effect.

#### **Default Gateway**

A gateway is a network device that connects networks. The default gateway setting is the IP address of such a device.

- You need not set a gateway address if using DHCP.
- Contact your LAN administrator for details.
- This setting is non-volatile; it will not be changed by power cycling or \*RST or SYSTem:PRESet.
- Front Panel:[Utility] > I/O Config > LAN Settings > Modify Settings

  Then set the first softkey to Manual and press More and Gateway. Then set the appropriate gateway address using the arrow keys.
- SCPI: SYSTem:COMMunicate:LAN:GATeway "<address>"
- If you change this parameter, you must either press the **Apply Changes** softkey (front panel) or send SYSTem:COMMunicate:LAN:UPDate (remote interface) for the change to take effect.

#### Hostname

A hostname is the host portion of the domain name, which is translated into an IP address.

- The instrument receives a unique hostname at the factory, but you may change it. The hostname must be unique on the LAN.
- The name must start with letter; other characters can be an upper or lower case letters, numeric digits, or dashes ("-").
- This setting is non-volatile; it will not be changed by power cycling or \*RST or SYSTem:PRESet.
- Front Panel:[Utility] > I/O Config > LAN Settings > Modify Settings
   Then press Host Name and enter the hostname with the front panel arrow keys.
- SCPI: SYSTem:COMMunicate:LAN:HOSTname "<name>"
- If you change this parameter, you must either press the **Apply Changes** softkey (front panel) or send SYSTem:COMMunicate:LAN:UPDate (remote interface) for the change to take effect.

#### **Domain Name**

A domain name is a registered Internet name that gets translated into an IP address. You cannot set it from the front panel or SCPI.

#### **DNS Server**

DNS (Domain Name Service) is an Internet service that translates domain names into IP addresses. The DNS server address is the IP address of a server that performs this service.

- Normally, DHCP discovers DNS address information; you only need to change this if DHCP is unused or not functional. Contact your LAN administrator for details.
- This setting is non-volatile; it will not be changed by power cycling or \*RST or SYSTem:PRESet.
- Front Panel:[Utility] > I/O Config > LAN Settings > Modify Settings
   Then set the first softkey to Manual and press More and Primary DNS or Second DNS to enter a DNS address using the front panel arrow keys.
- SCPI: SYSTem:COMMunicate:LAN:DNS[{1|2}] "<address>"
- If you change this parameter, you must either press the **Apply Changes** softkey (front panel) or send SYSTem:COMMunicate:LAN:UPDate (remote interface) for the change to take effect.

#### **Current Configuration (LAN)**

- Press [Utility] > I/O Config > LAN Settings to view the MAC address and current LAN configuration. There is no equivalent SCPI command.
- If the instrument goes into remote, all LAN changes will be canceled and the display will go to a different screen. Re-selecting the LAN Settings page will display the new settings if a LAN restart took place.

#### Web Interface

The instrument includes a built-in Web Interface for remote instrument access and control over LAN via a Web browser. For details, see Web Interface.

### LAN Configuration Procedure

There are several parameters that you might need to set to establish network communication using the LAN interface. Primarily, you will need to establish an IP address. You might need to contact your network administrator for help in establishing communication with the LAN interface.

If your instrument has the secure (SEC) option, the instrument must be unsecured to change most LAN settings.

- 1. Press [Utility] > I/O Config > LAN Settings.
- 2. You can select **Modify Settings** to change the LAN settings, or you can turn LAN Services on and off or restore the LAN settings to default values.



3. To change settings, press Modify Settings. To access most items on this screen, use the first softkey to switch from DHCP to Manual. With DHCP on, an IP address will automatically be set by DHCP (Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol) when you connect the instrument to the network, provided the DHCP server is found and is able to do so. DHCP also automatically deals with the subnet mask, gateway address, DNS, WINS, and domain name, if required. This is typically the easiest way to establish LAN communication for your instrument; all you need to do is leave DHCP on. Contact your LAN administrator for details.

#### 4. Establish an "IP Setup."

If you are not using DHCP (the first softkey is set to **Manual**), you must establish an IP setup, including an IP address, and possibly a subnet mask and gateway address. The **IP Address** and **Subnet Mask** buttons are on the main screen, and you press **More** to configure the Gateway.

Contact your network administrator for the IP address, subnet mask, and gateway to use. All IP addresses take the dot-notation form "nnn.nnn.nnn" where "nnn" in each case is a byte value in the range 0 through 255. You can enter a new IP address using the front panel arrow keys. Do not enter leading zeros.

### 5. Configure the "DNS Setup" (optional)

DNS (Domain Name Service) is an Internet service that translates domain names into IP addresses. Ask your network administrator whether DNS is in use, and if it is, for the host name, domain name, and DNS server address to use.

- a. Set the "hostname." Press **Host Name** and enter the hostname. A hostname is the host portion of the domain name, which is translated into an IP address. The hostname is entered as a string using the front panel arrow keys to select and change characters. The hostname may include letters, numbers, and dashes ("-").
- b. Set the "DNS Server" addresses. From the LAN configuration screen, press **More** to go to the second of three sets of softkeys.

Enter the Primary DNS and Second DNS. See your network administrator for details.

#### More about IP Addresses and Dot Notation

Dot-notation addresses ("nnn.nnn.nnn.nnn" where "nnn" is a byte value from 0 to 255) must be expressed with care, as most PC web software interprets byte values with leading zeros as octal (base 8) numbers. For example, "192.168.020.011" is actually equivalent to decimal "192.168.16.9" because ".020" is interpreted as "16" expressed in octal, and ".011" as "9". To avoid confusion, use only decimal values from 0 to 255, with no leading zeros.

### Firmware Update

Use the following procedure to update instrument firmware:

Do not turn off the instrument during the update.

- 1. Press [Help] > About to determine what instrument firmware version is currently installed.
- Go to www.keysight.com/find/truevolt and use the links there to find the latest firmware version. If
  this matches the version installed on your instrument, there is no need to continue with this procedure. Otherwise, download the firmware update utility and a ZIP file of the firmware. Detailed firmware instructions are in the Firmware Update Utility Instructions located on the download page.
- Unzip the ZIP file and use the firmware update utility to prepare a USB drive with the updated firmware:
- 4. Attach the USB drive to the instrument front panel and press [Utility] > Test / Admin > Firmware

  Update to update the firmware. If the security option is installed, unlock the instrument with the security code before installing firmware.

Important: In order to update the instrument firmware from remote, the model number in the \*IDN? response must match the actual instrument model number. If you have changed the instrument's \*IDN? response to another instrument, when attempting to update the firmware from remote, you will see this error: The instrument is not supported by this firmware file. To update the firmware, either update using the front panel procedure or, from remote, use SYSTem:IDENtify to set the \*IDN? to match the actual model number, update the firmware, and then use SYSTem:IDENtify again to set the \*IDN? response to the other model number.


# Setting the AC Mains Line Voltage Selector and Fuse Installation

WARNING

Before plugging the instrument into AC mains power, verify that the line voltage setting visible on the back of the AC mains input module is correct for the AC mains power source being connected. The line voltage selections are shown in a box on the rear panel immediately to the left of the AC mains input module. Other nominal line voltages are shown in parentheses.

Verify that the correct fuse is installed. To replace a blown fuse or verify the correct fuse, pull it gently from the fuse drawer and insert the correct working fuse. Use only a 5x20 mm,

time-lag, 0.25 A, 250 V certified fuse. The Keysight part number is 2110-0817.

Use the following procedure to configure the line voltage selector:

Step 1	Lift tab (1) and pull the fuse drawer (2) from the rear panel.	2
Step 2	Remove the line-voltage selector and rotate it so the correct voltage will appear in the fuse holder window.	
Step 3	Verify that the correct fuse is installed. To replace a blown fuse or verify the correct fuse, pull it gently from the fuse drawer and insert the correct working fuse. Use only a 5x20 mm, time-lag, 0.25 A, 250 V certified fuse. The Keysight part number is 2110-0817.	
Step 4	Replace the fuse holder assembly by sliding it into the rear panel.	

## **WARNING** Product Grounding

The instrument is a Class 1 product and is provided with a grounding-type power cord set. The instrument chassis and cover are connected to the instrument electrical ground to minimize shock hazard. The ground pin of the cord set plug must be firmly connected to the electrical ground (safety ground) terminal at the power outlet. Any interruption of the protective earth (grounding) conductor or disconnection of the protective earth terminal will cause a potential shock hazard that could result in personal injury or death.

#### Connect Power and I/O Cables

Connect the power cord and LAN, GPIB, or USB cable as desired. After you turn on the instrument (as described below), the instrument will run a power-on self test and then display a message about how to obtain help, along with the current IP address. It also displays the GPIB address (if applicable).

The instrument's default measurement function is DC Voltage (DCV), with autoranging enabled.



Press the power switch in the lower left corner of the front panel. If the instrument does not turn on, verify that the power cord is firmly connected and that the fuse is good and the line voltage selector is set correctly, as described above. Also make sure that the instrument is connected to an energized power source. If the LED below the power switch is off, there is no AC mains power connected. If the LED is amber, the instrument is in standby mode with AC mains power connected, and if it is green, the instrument is on.

In certain circumstances, the amber LED can come on even if the wrong line voltage is selected. In this case, the instrument may not power on.


If the power-on self test fails, the display shows **Error** in the upper right corner. It also displays a message describing the error. See SCPI Error Messages for information on error codes. See Service and Repair - Introduction for instructions on returning the instrument for service.

To turn off the instrument, press and hold the power switch for about 500 ms. This prevents you from accidentally turning off the instrument by brushing against the power switch.


NOTE If you turn off the instrument by disconnecting power (this is not recommended), the instrument turns on as soon as you re-apply power. You will not need to press the power switch.

# Adjust the Carrying Handle

The handle has three positions, shown below.



To adjust the handle position, grasp the sides of the handle, pull outward, and rotate the handle.




# Use Built-in Help System

The built-in help system provides context-sensitive help on any front panel key or menu softkey. A list of help topics is also available to help you learn about the instrument.

Press and hold any softkey or button, such as [Display].

If the message contains more information than will fit on the display, press the down arrow softkey to scroll down.








View the list of recent instrument errors.

Press and choose **View instrument errors** from the list of help topics. This displays the instrument's error queue, which includes up to 20 errors.

View the help information for displayed messages.

Whenever a limit is exceeded or any other invalid configuration is found, the instrument displays a message. The built-in help system provides additional information on the most recent message. Press [Shift] > [Help], select View the last message displayed, and press Select.



Press **Done** to exit Help.

# NOTE Local Language Help

All messages, context-sensitive help, and help topics are available in English, Chinese, French, German, Japanese, Korean, and Russian. To select the local language, press [Utility] > System Setup > User Settings > Help Lang. Then select the desired language.

The menu softkey labels and status line messages are not translated.

## Rack Mount the Instrument

You can mount the instrument in a standard 19-inch rack cabinet using one of two optional kits, each of which includes instructions and mounting hardware. You may also mount Another Keysight System II instrument of the same height and width beside the instrument.


To prevent overheating, do not block airflow to or from the instrument. Allow enough clearance at the rear, sides, and bottom of the instrument to permit adequate internal air flow.


Remove the carrying handle and the front and rear bumpers before rack-mounting the instrument.

To remove the handle, rotate it to vertical and pull the ends outward.



To remove the rubber bumper, stretch a corner and then slide it off.

To rack mount a single instrument, order adapter kit 5063-9240.




# Rack Mounting Instruments Side-by-Side

# Continuous, Data Log, and Digitize Modes

The 34465A/70A can operate in the continuous, data log, or digitize mode as described below.

The 34460A/61A DMMs always operate in the continuous mode -data log and digitize modes are not available on these models.

### Continuous Mode

Continuous mode is the default mode for all Truevolt DMMs. With the factory default settings, the DMM continuously makes DCV measurements with autorange and autozero on, NPLC set to 10 PLCs, etc. (see factory defaults for details).

# Data Log Mode


The Data Log mode is standard on the 34465A and 34470A only, as is available only from the DMM's front panel. Data Log mode provides a front–panel user interface that allows you to set up data logging into the instrument's non–volatile memory, or to internal/external file(s), without programming, and without a connection to a computer. Once you have finished collecting data, you can view it from the front panel, or you can transfer the data to your computer. Data Log mode allows you to log a specified number of readings, or readings acquired for a specified period of time, to instrument memory or to internal or external data files.

To select Data Log mode, press [Acquire] Acquire > Data Log. You can then select the Sample Interval (time between measurements - for example, 500 ms), Duration as either an amount of Time or a number of Readings, whether to Start after a Delay or at a specific Time of Day, and whether to Log to Memory or Log to File(s). After configuring the data logging parameters, press [Run/Stop]. Data logging will begin following the specified Delay or at the specified Time of Day.

### Digitize Mode

The digitize mode applies only to the 34465A/70A with the DIG option, and as is available only from the DMM's front panel. The digitized mode provides a front–panel user interface that allows you to quickly set up digitized measurements.

Digitizing is the process of converting a continuous analog signal, such as a sine wave, into a series of discrete samples (readings). The figure below shows the result of digitizing a sine wave. This chapter discusses the various ways to digitize signals. The importance of the sampling rate, and how to use level triggering.



# Data Log and Digitize Mode Default Settings

On entering data log or digitize mode, the DMM configures these settings:

- Trigger count set to 1 (trigger count is normally infinite when in Local and is not settable from the front panel).
- · Secondary measurements are turned off.
- Math smoothing is turned off.
- Statistics are cleared.
- Histogram is cleared.
- Trend chart is changed from the continuous, bucketized mode, to simple data graph.

# Additional Data Log Default Settings

On entering data log mode, the DMM configures these settings:

- Trigger source is set to auto.
- Trigger delay is set to auto.
- Pretrigger count is set to zero.
- Samples per trigger is set according to the data log duration (time or samples).
- Sample timer is put in timer (not immediate) mode and sample time is set according to the data log sample interval.

# Additional Digitize Default Settings

On entering digitize mode, the DMM configures these settings:

- If trigger source is set to manual it is changed to auto. (external and level remain as is.)
- Limits mode is turned off.
- Scaling is turned off.
- Statistic and histogram are put in post-processing mode (computed after digitize is complete).
- On the selected function (DCV or DCI) and for the new function if changed:
  - Autorange is turned off.
  - Autozero is turned off.
  - NPLC and aperture are set to their minimum values.
- If trigger source is external or level, the pretrigger count is set to the digitize pretrigger count setting (default of 0).
- Samples per trigger is set according to the digitize duration (time or samples).
- Sample timer is put in timer (not immediate) mode and Sample timer is set according to the digitize sample rate or sample interval.
- Trend Chart mode is changed to bucketized when data logging to a file.
- On return to Continuous mode, settings are left as done in data log or digitize mode except:
  - Sample source is set to immediate.
  - Pretrigger count is set to 0.
  - Samples per trigger is set to 1.
  - Trigger count is set to infinite.







• For the 34465A/70A, the Aperture NPLC softkey is selected by default. Use the up/down arrow keys to specify integration time in power-line cycles (PLCs) to use for the measurement . 1, 10, and 100 PLC provide normal mode (line frequency noise) rejection. To set integration time precisely, instead of using PLCs, press **Aperture Time** and use the left/right up/down arrow keys to specify integration time in seconds. 
Step 6: Specify the input impedance to the test leads (Input Z). This specifies the measurement terminal input impedance, which is either Auto or 10 M $\Omega$ . The Auto mode selects high impedance (HighZ) for the 100 mV, 1 V and 10 V ranges, and 10 M $\Omega$  for the 100 V and 1000 V ranges. In most situations, 10 M $\Omega$  is high enough to not load most circuits, but low enough to make readings stable for high impedance circuits. It also leads to readings with less noise than the **HighZ** option, which is included for situations where the 10 M $\Omega$  load is significant.

#### **DCV Ratio**

The **DCV Ratio** key enables or disables DCV Ratio measurement. Note that the **Auto Zero** softkey disappears when you enable DCV Ratio measurements. This is because autozero cannot be disabled during DCV Ratio.

The ratio is the voltage on the Input terminals divided by the reference voltage. The reference voltage is the difference of two separate measurements. These measurements are the DC voltages from the HI Sense terminal to the LO Input terminal and from the LO Sense terminal to the LO Input terminal. These two measurements must be within the range of  $\pm 12$  VDC. The reference voltage is always autoranged, and the range used for both will be based on the larger result of these two measurements.

## AC Voltage

This section describes how to configure AC voltage measurements from the front panel.

Default delays are selected to give correct first readings for most measurements. For the most accurate measurements, the input blocking RC time constant must settle to 1/50 of the AC signal level.

Signals greater than 300 V (rms) or 1 A (rms) will cause self-heating in signal-conditioning components. These errors are included in the instrument specifications. Internal temperature changes due to self-heating may cause additional error on other functions or ranges. The additional error will generally dissipate within a few minutes.

For example, consider a 100 mVAC signal with a 10 VDC bias. The 10 VDC bias should be settled to 1/50 of 100 mVAC, or 2 mVDC. The corresponding settling time can be calculated using the blocking RC time constant of 0.22 s as follows:



settling time = ln(bias/settled value) * 0.22 s

settling time = ln(10 VDC / 2 mVDC) * 0.22 s


settling time = ln(5000) * 0.22 s = 1.9 s
```

This additional settling delay should be applied after connecting the signal to the DMM's ACV input or after selecting the ACV function with the signal already connected. If the DC bias remains constant, subsequent measurements can be made to full accuracy without additional settling delays.

The three filters are 3 Hz, 20 Hz, and 200 Hz, and you should generally select the highest frequency filter whose frequency is less than that of the signal you are measuring, because higher frequency filters result in faster measurements. For example, when measuring a signal between 20 and 200 Hz, use the 20 Hz filter.

If measurement speed is not an issue, choosing a lower frequency filter may result in quieter measurements, depending on the signal that you are measuring.





With low power On, pressing **Range** displays the lower current sourced for each range:



Low-power resistance measurements apply to the  $100\Omega$  through  $100k\Omega$  ranges only. The 1 M $\Omega$  through 1 G $\Omega$  ranges source the same current regardless of the low-power setting.

#### **Negative Resistance Measurements**

Under certain conditions, the instrument may report negative resistance measurements. These may occur in 2-wire and 4-wire resistance measurements or continuity measurements.

Conditions that may cause negative ohms values include:

- Changes in Front/Rear switch contact resistance
- Reversed Sense Hi and Lo leads
- Circuits with external bias or thermal voltages at circuit connections
- Changes in measurement connection after a NULL operation

Under the same conditions, the 34401A returns the measurement's absolute value so as to prevent the confusion associated with negative readings. The Keysight Truevolt Series DMMs will return negative values. This allows the most accurate results after a NULL operation.



#### Thermistor Requirements

The DMM converts the measured thermistor resistance to temperature using the Steinhart-Hart thermistor equation:

$$1/T = A + B (Ln(R)) + C (Ln(R))^3$$

Where:

A, B, and C are constants provided by the thermistor manufacturer and derived from three temperature test points.

 $R = Thermistor resistance in \Omega$ .

T = Temperature in degrees K.

**Important:** Use only a 5 k $\Omega$  44007-type thermistor. This type thermistor has constants of A = 1.285e-3, B = 2.362e-4, C = 9.285e-8. Using an incorrect type of thermistor can result in errors greater than 20 °C for a temperature being measured of 100 °C.

### For the TCouple Probe Type...

The **TCouple** probe types allows these settings:




Type: Select the type of thermocouple. Supported types are J (default), K, E, T, N, or R

**Reference**: Thermocouple measurements require a reference junction temperature. You can input a known fixed reference junction temperature (typically used for external reference junctions) or use the internally measured temperature of the front terminals as the reference junction temperature. Select internal or fixed reference.


**Important:** Since the internal reference temperature is the temperature of the *front* connections, use of the *rear* connections with the selection of the internal reference junction will have an unknown error with no specified performance and is not recommended.

Offset Adjust: Allows you to make minor temperature adjustments to correct for the differences between the DMM internal temperature measurement of the front connection and the actual temperature of the measurement terminals. When you select the internal reference junction, the internal temperature measurement of the front terminals plus the specified offset value is used as the reference junction temperature. For example, if the measured internal temperature is +20.68 °C and the specified offset is +5 °C, the artificial cold junction mathematics uses the sum of the two values. Keysight recommends that the offset be left at 0 unless metrology has indicated otherwise.

**Fixed Offset**: When you select the external reference junction, you must specify the reference junction temperature in degrees Celsius. Enter a value from -20 °C to +80 °C. Default: 0 °C. For example, to set the fixed reference temperature to +23.36 °C:



Press **Done** to return to the main temperature menu showing additional settings for thermocouple measurements:


**Open Check**: Disables or enables the *thermocouple check* feature to verify that your thermocouples are properly connected for measurements. When enabled, the instrument measures the resistance after each thermocouple measurement to ensure a proper connection. If an open connection is detected (greater than  $5 \text{ k}\Omega$  on the  $10 \text{ k}\Omega$  range), the instrument reports an overload condition.



For capacitance measurements only, when autorange is off, the instrument does not report an overload for readings greater than 120% of range. Overload only occurs when the algorithm times out because the applied capacitance is too large for the algorithm to measure. If you apply a DC voltage or a short to the input terminals in capacitance measurement mode, the instrument reports an overload.



# Diode

This section describes how to configure diode tests from the front panel. The range and resolution are fixed; the range is 10 VDC (with a 1 mA current source output).

Step 1: Configure the test leads as shown.



**Step 2:** Press on the front panel to open a menu that specifies whether the DMM will beep to indicate a successful diode test.




Diode measurements behave as follows:

		voltage displayed on the front panel, and instrument beeps when signal transitions into the 0.3 to 0.8 V threshold (if beeping is enabled)
> 5 V the front panel displays OPEN, and SCPI returns 9.9E37		the front panel displays OPEN, and SCPI returns 9.9E37

# Frequency and Period

This section describes how to configure frequency and period measurements from the front panel.

**Step 1:** Configure the test leads as shown.



**Step 2:** Press [Freq] on the front panel and then use the first softkey to choose either frequency or period measurement.

Freq	Range	AC Filter	Gate Time	Timeout	
Period	Auto	>20Hz	100ms	1s	

**Step 3:** Press **Range** to select a range for the measurement. (**Auto** (autorange) automatically selects the range for the measurement based on the input. Autoranging is convenient, but it results in slower measurements than using a manual range. Autoranging goes up a range at 120% of the present range, and down a range below 10% of the present range.

Select Frequency Voltage Range					
Auto	100mV	1V	10V	100V	750V

**Step 4:** Press **AC Filter** and choose the filter for the measurement. The instrument uses three different AC filters that enable you either to optimize low frequency accuracy or to achieve faster AC settling times following a change in input signal amplitude.

The three filters are 3 Hz, 20 Hz, and 200 Hz, and you should generally select the highest frequency filter whose frequency is less than that of the signal you are measuring, because higher frequency filters result in faster measurements. For example, when measuring a signal between 20 and 200 Hz, use the 20 Hz filter.

If measurement speed is not an issue, choosing a lower frequency filter may result in quieter measurements, depending on the signal that you are measuring.



**Step 5:** Press **Gate Time** and choose the measurement aperture (integration time) of 1 ms (34465A/70A only) 10 ms, 100 ms (default), or 1 s.



**Step 6:** (34465A/70A only) Press **Timeout** to control how long the instrument waits before timing out on a frequency or period measurement when no signal is present. When set to 1s, the instrument waits 1 second before timing out. When set to Auto, the wait time varies with AC filter bandwidth; for the faster bandwidths, the instrument waits a shorter time before timing out and returning 0.0. This is advantageous in manufacturing test systems where a DUT failure may result in no signal; in this case, the failure can be detected sooner, speeding up test throughput.



For accurate displayed statistics of AC measurements in Front Panel mode, the default manual trigger delay ([Acquire] > Delay Man) must be used.

# Data Logging

The Data Log mode is standard on the 34465A and 34470A only, as is available only from the DMM's front panel. Data Log mode provides a front–panel user interface that allows you to set up data logging into the instrument's non–volatile memory, or to internal/external file(s), without programming, and without a connection to a computer. Once you have finished collecting data, you can view it from the front panel, or you can transfer the data to your computer. Data Log mode allows you to log a specified number of readings, or readings acquired for a specified period of time, to instrument memory or to internal or external data files.

To select Data Log mode, press [Acquire] Acquire > Data Log. You can then select the Sample Interval (time between measurements - for example, 500 ms), Duration as either an amount of Time or a number of Readings, whether to Start after a Delay or at a specific Time of Day, and whether to Log to Memory or Log to File(s). After configuring the data logging parameters, press [Run/Stop]. Data logging will begin following the specified Delay or at the specified Time of Day.

Data Log mode can be used with the DC voltage, DC current, AC voltage, AC current, 2-wire and 4-wire resistance, frequency, period, temperature, capacitance, and ratio measurement functions (diode and continuity are excluded). The maximum reading rate is 1000 readings/s and the maximum duration is 100 hours resulting in a maximum number of readings of 360,000,000 to file. The number of readings you can log to memory depends on the amount of instrument memory. With the MEM option, the limit is 2,000,000 readings; without the MEM option, the limit is 50,000 readings. By default, data logging implements auto trigger. The level and external trigger sources are not supported for data logging.

#### CAUTION

Loss of data possible - local to remote transition clears instrument memory: When data logging or digitizing to memory, if you access the instrument from remote (send a SCPI or common command)\* and then return to local (by pressing [Local]), the readings in memory are cleared and the instrument returns to Continuous mode.

For data logging only, you can prevent this situation by data logging to a file instead of to memory (see Data Log Mode for details). You can also prevent this from happening for data logging or digitizing by taking steps to keep the instrument from being accessed from remote. To prevent remote access, you may want to disconnect the LAN, GPIB, and USB interface cables from the instrument before starting the measurements. To prevent remote access via LAN, you can connect the instrument behind a router to minimize the possibility of remote access. You can also disable the various I/O interfaces from the front panel menus under [Utility] > I/O Config.

To view the status of a data logging or digitizing operation remotely, use the instrument's Web User Interface. The Web User Interface monitor does not set the instrument to remote.

\*When accessed from remote, the instrument will continue data logging or digitizing to completion, and you can retrieve the readings from remote.

### **Data Logging Overview**

This section is a summary of the steps involved in setting up data logging. Detailed steps are described below in Detailed Data Logging Steps.


#### Features and Functions

- 1. Select the measurement function and make connections to the DUT (see Measurements for details).
- Select Data Log mode (press [Acquire] > Acquire > Data Log).
- 3. Specify the sample interval (time between readings) for example, 20 ms.
- 4. Specify the duration as amount of time or number of readings.
- 5. Specify when to start data logging (delay or time of day). You can only use auto trigger (default) or single trigger (press [Single]) for data logging.
- 6. Select whether to log data to memory or internal or external data file(s).
- 7. Press [Run/Stop] or [Single]. Data logging starts when the specified delay has elapsed or the time of day occurs (specified in Step 5). Data logging will stop after the specified duration (time or number of readings) has occurred or after you press [Run/Stop] again.

# **Detailed Data Logging Steps**

**Note:** For more information, on any of the softkeys described below, such as the range of values for a particular setting, press and hold the softkey to display help for that softkey.

**Step 1:** Select the measurement function and make connections to the DUT (see Measurements for details). For example, press **DCV** and configure the test leads as shown.



Step 2: Press [Acquire] on the front panel to display these softkeys:



Press the **Acquire** softkey.



Press the **Data Log** softkey. The Data Log menu opens:



Step 3: Press Sample Interval and specify the time interval between samples (readings).

**Note:** You may see this message when configuring data logging: Sample interval is limited by measurement settings. The measurement time is determined by the measurement function, NPLC, Aperture, Autorange, Autozero, Offset Compensation, AC Filter, TC Open Check, and Gate Time. The data logging Sample Interval cannot be less than the measurement time. You can shorten the measurement time by selecting less integration time, selecting a fixed range, and so on.



**Step 4:** Press the **Duration** softkey to specify the length of time to log data, or, press **Duration** again to specify the total number of readings to log.

Step 5: Press Start to specify when to start data logging. You can select:

- Start Delay Starts data logging after a specified time delay. Specified in HH.MM.SS format.
- Start Time of Day Starts data logging at a specified time of day. Specified in HH.MM.SS format. Using the time of day requires that the instrument's real-time clock is properly set. To set the clock, press [Shift] > [Utility] > System Setup > Date/Time.




You cannot configure a trigger source when data logging. You can only use auto trigger (selected by default) or, when ready to initiate data logging, you can cause a single trigger (by pressing [Single]). The effect is the same, as you only need one auto trigger or single trigger event to enable data logging.

**Step 6:** Press **Log To Memory** or **Log To Files** to specify whether the data logging results will be stored in volatile memory for display or written to one or more internal/external files.

• When data logging to memory, the data is volatile (not remaining during power off) but can be saved to an internal or external file after data logging is complete (see Step 7 below). The number of readings you can store in memory depends on the amount of instrument memory. With the MEM option, the limit is 2,000,000 readings. Without the MEM option, the limit is 50,000 readings.

• When data logging to file(s), **Browse** to an internal or external path and specify a **File Name**. If more than one file needs to be created to hold the data, the second file name will be appended with \_00001, the third file name with \_00002, and so on. When data logging to files, the maximum number of readings is 360,000,000.



When **Add Date** is **On**, the data logging start date and time is appended to the file name using the format:

\_YYYYMMDD\_HHMMSS

For example, for a file named Data 1, the result will be similar to: Data 1\_20140720\_032542.

Press **Options** to to configure reading storage options:



**Rows/File** - Specifies the maximum number of rows or readings to be written to a file. For  $\mathbf{Max}$ , the limit is the number of bytes allowed by the file system ( $2^{32} = 4.294967296$  GBytes). This represents approximately 252 M readings with Metadata Off, or 159 M readings with Metadata On. For  $\mathbf{1M}$ , the limit is 1,000,000 rows in the resulting file. This allows you to accommodate common spreadsheet, database and data analysis programs that have limitations of 1 million rows per file.

**Metadata** - Enables reading number, time stamp of first reading, and sample interval (if available) in the file.

**Separator** - Specifies the character (Comma, Tab, or Semicolon) to use for separating the information on each row.

When finished configuring reading storage, press **Done** > **Done** to return to the main data logging menu.


**Step 7:** Press [Run/Stop] or [Single]. Data logging starts when the specified delay has elapsed or the time of day occurs (specified in Step 5). Data logging will stop after the specified duration (time or number of readings) has occurred or after you press [Run/Stop] again.

When data logging is complete:

- When data logging to file(s), the instrument saves the file(s) with the specified name and path.
- When data logging to memory, you can now save the readings from the main data log menu by pressing Save Readings.



You can then **Browse** to an internal or external path and specify a **File Name**. You can also specify reading storage **Options** as described above in Step 6.




### **Trend Chart for Data Logging**

# Digitizing

The digitizing feature (applies only to the 34465A/70A with the DIG option) provides a front–panel user interface that allows you to quickly set up digitized measurements. Digitizing is the process of converting a continuous analog signal, such as a sine wave, into a series of discrete samples (readings):



See Digitizing Measurements for a tutorial on digitizing and more information on samples rates vs. input frequencies.

The DMM digitizes by sampling the input signal using either the DCV function (default) or the DCI function with autorange and autozero disabled.

#### CAUTION

Loss of data possible - local to remote transition clears instrument memory: When data logging or digitizing *to memory*, if you access the instrument from remote (send a SCPI or common command)\* and then return to local (by pressing [Local]), the readings in memory are cleared and the instrument returns to Continuous mode.

For data logging only, you can prevent this situation by data logging to a file instead of to memory (see Data Log Mode for details). You can also prevent this from happening for data logging or digitizing by taking steps to keep the instrument from being accessed from remote. To prevent remote access, you may want to disconnect the LAN, GPIB, and USB interface cables from the instrument before starting the measurements. To prevent remote access via LAN, you can connect the instrument behind a router to minimize the possibility of remote access. You can also disable the various I/O interfaces from the front panel menus under [Utility] > I/O Config.

### **Digitizing Overview**


This section is a summary of the steps involved in setting up digitizing. Detailed steps are described below in Detailed Digitizing Steps.

- 1. Select DCV or DCI measurements and connect to the DUT.
- Select Digitize mode (press [Acquire] > Acquire > Digitize).
- 3. Specify the sample rate (for example, 50 kHz) or sample interval (for example, 20  $\mu$ S).
- 4. Specify the duration as amount of time or number of readings.
- 5. Select trigger source (Auto, Ext, or Level).
- a. For external, specify polarity.
- b. For level, use Range +/- to select fixed range, then specify threshold and polarity.
- 6. Specify delay time or use auto.
- 7. Optional: If using the level or external trigger source, specify a pretrigger count (number of readings to store before the trigger event occurs).
- 8. Press [Run/Stop]. Digitizing starts when the trigger event occurs and stops after duration or when you press [Run/Stop] again.
- 9. Save the digitized data to a file.
- 10. Optional: select trend chart to view digitized data.


The histogram and statistics functions can be used when digitizing. However, this data will not be updated until digitizing is complete.

# **Detailed Digitizing Steps**


**Step 1:** To digitize DC voltage, press **DCV** and configure the test leads as shown.



To digitize DC current, press **DCI** and configure the test leads as shown.



On the 34461A/65A/70A, you can also configure the measurement using the 10 A terminal, which is recommended when measuring current above 1 A:



Step 2: Press [Acquire] on the front panel and then press the Acquire softkey:



Press the **Digitize** softkey:




Step 3: The Digitize menu opens:



With **Sample Rate** selected, use the up/down arrow keys to select a sample rate in samples per second (Hz), or press the **Sample Rate** softkey to specify a sample interval (time between samples):



**Step 4:** Press the **Duration** softkey to specify the length of time to digitize:



or, press Duration again to specify the total number of samples to digitize:



**Step 5:** Press **Trigger Settings** to view or change the trigger source. By default, the trigger source is set to auto. You can also select external and level triggering when digitizing.



Press Trg Source and select one of three trigger sources:



Auto - the instrument automatically triggers immediately after you press [Run/Stop] or [Single].

Step 5a Configure external triggering: After pressing Ext, this menu appears:



**Ext** - the instrument triggers when an edge of the appropriate slope arrives at the rear-panel Ext Trig connector. You can specify the slope on the softkey menu that appears when **Trg Src** is set to Ext. To select external triggering, press **Ext**, and select either Pos or Neg slope:

**Step 5b Select level trigger: Level -** (34465A/70A with DIG option only) the instrument issues one trigger when the specified measurement threshold with the specified positive or negative slope occurs. To select level triggering, press **Level** and specify the level threshold and Pos or Neg slope:



Select the expected measurement range using the [Range] [+] and [-] keys before setting the level trigger voltage or current.

#### **Step 6:** Specify delay time

Specify the delay that occurs prior to digitizing. This delay is inserted once, after the trigger event occurs, and before digitizing begins. This can be automatic (the instrument chooses the delay based on the instrument's settling time) or manual (you specify the delay time).


**Step 7:** (Optional) Specify pretrigger count.

When an External or Level Trigger Source is used, you can specify a pretrigger count. After specifying a pretrigger count, readings are taken and held in a buffer while waiting for the trigger event to occur. When the trigger event occurs, the buffered readings are transferred to reading memory and the remaining readings are recorded as usual. If the trigger event occurs before Pretrigger Count readings have been taken, the trigger event will still take effect and digitizing will complete without having taken all of the pretrigger readings. The Pretrigger Count is limited to one less than the total number of readings specified to be taken by the Duration setting.

**Step 8:** Press [Run/Stop] to start the digitizing process. Digitizing will begin when the specified trigger event occurs and after the specified delay has elapsed. • Digitizing is displayed at the top of the display while digitizing; when finished, Digitize Stopped is displayed.

**Step 9:** All readings taken during digitizing are saved in volatile memory, when digitizing is finished, press the **Save Readings** softkey to specify a file location and save the readings.


**Step 10:** (Optional) Press **Display > Display Trend** to view the trend chart. The Trend Chart is particularly useful for viewing and analyzing digitized measurements. X and Y cursors (shown below), tracking cursors, pan control, and zoom allow you to analyze digitized data. See **Trend Chart** (**Digitize and Data Log Modes**) for details.

# Level Triggering

Level triggering is available only on the 34465A/70A with the DIG option. Level triggering allows you to trigger measurements at some defined point on the input signal, such as when the signal crosses zero volts or when it reaches the midpoint of its positive or negative peak amplitude. For example, this graphic shows sampling beginning as the input signal crosses OV with a positive slope:



### **About Level Trigger**

Level triggering is available for these measurement functions:

- DC voltage and DC current
- AC voltage and AC current
- 2-wire and 4-wire resistance with offset compensation off, and low power off
- Temperature, RTD or thermistor sensors only
- Frequency and period

The level trigger is edge-sensitive. That is, the instrument must detect a *change* in the quantity being measured from one side of the level setting to the other side (direction controlled by Slope setting). For example, if the Slope is positive, then the quantity being measured must first reach a value *below* the set level before a trigger event can be detected.

Level trigger performance is not uniform. Its accuracy, latency, and sensitivity are dependent on other DMM features. These dependencies vary by measurement function as described below.

#### DC voltage, DC current, and 2-wire resistance considerations

These measurement functions can use a fast-response detector built into the hardware for fixed-range measurements. For lowest latency and highest sensitivity, use a fixed range when using level trigger. However, trigger level accuracy is reduced when the hardware detector is used.

To increase trigger level accuracy and reduce sensitivity (avoid false triggers due to noise), use autorange:

• When auto-range is enabled, trigger level accuracy is increased, latency is increased, and sensitivity is decreased as the aperture or NPLC setting is increased.

#### Features and Functions

- When auto-range is enabled, trigger level accuracy is increased, latency is increased, and sensitivity is decreased if autozero is enabled.
- When auto-range is enabled, range changes may be made while waiting for the trigger crossing which can cause additional latency/uncertainty.

### 4-wire resistance and temperature considerations

- Trigger level accuracy is increased, latency is increased, and sensitivity is decreased as aperture or NPLC is increased.
- Fixed range (only available for resistance) eliminates uncertainties (due to range change) in trigger latency.

### AC voltage and AC current considerations


- Trigger latency is increased, and sensitivity is decreased as filter bandwidth is increased.
- Trigger latency can be controlled by trigger delay setting.
- Fixed range eliminates uncertainties (due to range change) in trigger latency.
- Autorange uncertainties become worse as filter bandwidth is increased.

### Frequency and period considerations

- Trigger level accuracy is increased, latency is increased, and sensitivity is decreased as gate time is increased.
- Fixed voltage range eliminates uncertainties (due to range change) in trigger latency.

# Secondary Measurements

Most measurement functions allow you to select and display a secondary measurement function. Secondary measurements can be displayed in the Number and Bar Meter displays only. For example, a thermistor temperature measurement (primary) and the resistance measurement made on the thermistor (secondary) are shown below:



To select a secondary measurement from the front panel, first select the primary measurement function and then press **Display**:



Press **2nd Meas** and select the secondary measurement.

The primary measurement functions and their associated secondary measurements for each DMM model are:

#### Where:

- Pre-Math The measurement value before any math operations are done (including NULL).
- Sensor The raw sensor value; ohms for thermistor/RTD, volts for thermocouple (thermocouple measurements apply to the 34465A and 34470A only).
- Input/Ref The DC signal voltage and the DC reference voltage measurements.
- Peak Displays a running history of the minimum peak, maximum peak, and peak-to-peak values of the
  input signal. Peak measurements are high-speed (16 μs effective aperture) and are different from the Min,
  Max, and Peak-to-Peak values gathered in Statistics.
  - <sup>1</sup> After making one or more primary measurements for approximately 4 seconds, the DMM makes one secondary measurement.

For the Peak secondary measurement, the **Clear Peaks** softkey allows you to clear the accumulated history of the peak-to-peak function (resets the record of peak values).



# Triggering and Readings

The trigger model and large reading memory on the True*volt* Series DMMs provide versatile capabilities for a wide variety of applications.

# Instrument trigger model

Acquiring measurements on the DMM is done as the result of triggering. This section describes how to configure triggering for the Continuous measurement mode. For the 34465A/70A, refer to Digitizing and Data Logging for information on triggering in those measurement modes.

For the 34460A/61A, pressing [Acquire] opens the following menu:



For the 34465A/70A, pressing [Acquire] opens the following menu:



Press **Trigger Settings** to open the following menu:



The menus above allow you to configure measurement triggering, and you can also use the **VMC Out** softkey to set the edge slope of the **VM Comp** (voltmeter complete) output on the instrument's rear panel. This connector issues a signal whenever the voltmeter finishes taking a measurement to allow you to signal other devices in a measurement system.

For accurate displayed statistics of AC measurements in Front Panel mode, the default manual trigger delay ([Acquire] > Delay Man) must be used.

The (Trg Src) menu allows you to select one of these trigger sources:



**Auto** - the instrument continuously takes measurements, automatically issuing a new trigger as soon as a measurement is completed.

Single - the instrument issues one trigger each time the front panel [Single] key is pressed.

#### Features and Functions

**Ext** - (Ext requires LAN option on 34460A) the instrument issues one trigger each time an edge of the appropriate slope arrives at the rear-panel Ext Trig connector. You can specify the slope on the softkey menu that appears when **Trg Src** is set to Ext.

**Level -** (34465A/70A with DIG option only) the instrument issues one trigger when the specified measurement threshold with the specified positive or negative slope occurs.

In the Single, Ext, and Level modes, you can specify the number of samples to be taken per trigger by using the **Samples/Trigger** softkey. The Single and Ext modes can both buffer up to one trigger, meaning that if you press [**Single**] or receive an external trigger while a series of measurements is in progress, the instrument will finish that series of measurements and then immediately launch a new series of measurements based on the trigger.

If multiple [Single] or external triggers are issued during a series of measurements, all triggers received after the first are discarded.

The [Acquire] menu also configures the delay that occurs before each measurement is taken, regardless of the trigger mode (Auto, Single, or Ext). This may be either automatic (the delay is based on the DMM's settling time) or manual (you specify the delay time).


Finally, note the [Run/Stop] and [Single] keys on the front panel. In Auto trigger mode, pressing [Run-/Stop] stops and resumes measurements, and pressing [Single] switches the instrument to single trigger mode. In the Single and Ext modes, pressing [Run/Stop] stops readings if they are in progress, or switches the mode to Auto if readings are stopped.

# Trigger delay and multiple samples

The instrument inserts a trigger delay between the occurrence of a trigger and the first measurement. When **Auto** is used (**Delay Auto** softkey), the instrument automatically determines the delay based on function, range and integration time. See **Automatic Trigger Delays** for further information. However, you may need to manually set a delay (**Delay Man** softkey) longer than the automatic delay to allow the input to settle before pacing a burst of measurements, for measurements with long cables, or for measurements of high capacitance or high impedance signals.


If you have configured the instrument for more than one sample per trigger (**Samples/Trigger** softkey), in all cases, the first sample is taken one trigger delay time after the trigger occurs. Beyond that, sample timing depends on whether you select immediate (**Sample Immediate** softkey, default) or timer (**Sample Timer** softkey) as described below.

• **Sample Immediate** - The first sample starts one trigger delay time after the trigger, and then the trigger delay time is inserted between successive samples:



In this configuration, the sample timing *is not* deterministic because the delay time is inserted after each sample completes. The actual time required to take each sample depends on the integration time and autoranging time.

• Sample Timer - The first sample starts one trigger delay time after the trigger. The second sample starts one sample interval after the start of the first sample, and so on:



In this configuration, the sample timing *is* deterministic because the start of each sample is determined by the specified sample interval (the trigger delay affects only the start of the first sample). Integration time and autoranging affect the sampling time for each sample, but not the sample interval. Periodic sampling continues until the sample count (set with the **Samples/Trig** softkey) is satisfied.

#### Features and Functions

From the front panel, the instrument prevents you from specifying a sample timer that is shorter than the time required to make measurements based on the present function, range, and integration time.

# Storing and clearing readings


You can store up to 1,000 measurements in the reading memory of the 34460A, 10,000 measurements on the 34461A, 50,000 measurements on the 34465A/70A (*without* the MEM option), or 2,000,000 measurements on the 34465A/70A (*with* the MEM option). Readings are stored in a first-in, first-out (FIFO) buffer; when reading memory is full, the oldest readings are lost as newer readings are taken.

In Local (front panel) mode, the instrument collects readings, statistics, trend chart and histogram information in the background, so if you select any of those options, the data is ready for viewing. In Remote (SCPI) mode, the instrument does not collect this information by default.

Changing the instrument from Local to Remote does NOT clear any readings in memory. Changing the instrument from Remote to Local DOEs clear any readings in memory.

In general, you turn the reading of measurements on and off by pressing [Run/Stop], as described above. You can also take one reading or a specified number of readings by pressing [Single].

To save readings, press [Acquire] > Save Readings. Then use the menu that appears to configure the location where you want to save the readings:



See Utility Menu - Manage Files for details.

For the 34460A/61A only, press Save Readings to save the readings in memory to a file.

For the 34465A/70A only, press **Options** to configure reading storage options:



Rows/File - Specifies the maximum number of rows or readings to be written to a file.

- For  $\mathbf{Max}$ , the limit is the number of bytes allowed by the file system ( $2^{32} = 4.294967296$  GBytes). This represents approximately 252 M readings with Metadata Off, or 159 M readings with Metadata On.
- For **1M**, the limit is 1,000,000 rows in the resulting file. This allows you to accommodate common spreadsheet, database and data analysis programs that have limitations of 1 million rows per file.

**Metadata** - Enables reading number, time stamp of first reading, and sample interval (if available) in the file.

**Separator** - Specifies the character (Comma, Tab, or Semicolon) to use for separating the information on each row.

When finished configuring reading storage, press **Done** > **Save Readings** to save the readings in memory to a file.

### **Clearing Reading Memory**



- · Changing the position of the Front/Rear switch
- Transferring from Remote to Local mode
- Turning Null on or off or changing the Null value

## These actions do not clear reading memory:

- Changing measurement parameters, such as range and aperture.
- Turning limits on or off, or adjusting limit values
- Pressing [Run/Stop] in front panel auto trigger mode
- Changing the trend chart Recent/All softkey (34461A/65A/70A only)
- Changing samples per trigger or trigger delay
- Changing display modes
- Changing the VM Comp output polarity
- Changing the digit mask
- Changing the histogram, bar meter, or trend chart scale
- Changing user preferences
- Executing self-test

# Probe Hold

Because probing small areas requires careful concentration, it is often difficult to read the instrument display while taking measurements. Therefore, the instrument includes a front panel [**Probe Hold**] key that allows you to take readings without viewing the display. You can generate up to eight readings and hold them on the display for later viewing. These readings may be of different measurement types and you may clear displayed readings at any time.



In Probe Hold mode, the instrument optimizes measurement settings to allow reliable detection of stable signals (these settings are restored to their original values when you exit Probe Hold.) When you probe a signal, the instrument beeps (if the beeper is enabled) and automatically records a measurement when it finds a series of stable readings. You may take additional readings without pressing [**Probe Hold**] again.

Press **Remove Last** to remove the last reading from the list. Press **Clear List** to remove all readings from the list.

Because the Probe Hold display is optimized for the Probe Hold readings, you may not combine it with other display modes, such as histogram, bar graph, trend chart, or statistics.

Probe Hold is a front panel only function. Readings recorded in Probe Hold mode cannot be accessed from remote. You can, however, take a screen capture of the probe hold display, see Utility Menu - Manage Files for details.

### Math - Null

A null reading is a value that is subtracted from all subsequent measurements. The value is specific to the present function and will persist even if you leave this function and return to it later.

One common use of this feature is to remove lead resistance from a resistance measurement. To do this, simply short the test leads together and press [Null]. For other measurement functions, place the probes across a null value circuit before pressing [Null].

You can also specify a null value by pressing [Math], changing the first softkey to Value, and entering the value using the arrow keys. To turn off the null feature, press [Null] again or press [Math] and set the first softkey to Off.

# Math - dB/dBm Scaling



This topic describes dB/dBm Scaling for the 34460A/61A. Scaling features are different for the 34465A/70A and are described in the Scaling topic.

The dB and dBm scaling functions, which apply to ACV and DCV measurements only, allow you to scale measurements relative to a reference value.

NOTE Scaling is set to OFF when you change measurement functions (for example, changing from DCV to ACV). You must re-enable scaling after changing measurement functions.

#### Front Panel Menus

The dB and dBm functions are accessed from the second softkey in the [Math] menu.



When the first softkey in the dB / dBm menu is enabled, as shown below, you will see one of the following menus:

### dB Scaling

Each dB measurement is the difference between the input signal and a stored reference value, with both values converted to dBm:

dB = reading in dBm - reference value in dBm

The relative value must be from -200 to +200 dBm (default 0). You can either measure this value by pressing **Measure Ref Value**, or you can enter a specified value.

# Math - Scaling



This topic describes dB/dBm Scaling for the 34465A/70A. Scaling features are different for the 34460A/61A and are described in the dB dBm Scaling Menus topic.

Press the **Scaling** softkey to open the default dB scaling menu:



Press the **Function** softkey to select a scaling function:



Scaling is set to OFF when you change measurement functions (for example, changing from DCV to ACV). You must re-enable scaling after changing measurement functions.

### dB Scaling

Each dB measurement is the difference between the input signal and a stored reference value, with both values converted to dBm:

dB = reading in dBm - reference value in dBm

The relative value must be from -200 to +200 dBm (default 0). You can either measure this value by pressing **Measure Ref Value**, or you can use the **dB Ref Value** softkey to specify a value.

dB scaling applies to ACV and DCV measurements only.

#### dBm Scaling



The dBm function is logarithmic, comparing power delivered to a reference resistance, relative to 1 milliwatt:

dBm scaling applies to ACV and DCV measurements only.

# % Scaling



% performs a percent change operation. The result is the percent change of the measurement from the reference value:

Result = ((Measurement - Reference) / Reference) \* 100.

Press **Measure Reference** to use the first measurement as the reference value, or press **Ref Value** to specify the reference value.

% scaling applies to all measurement functions except Ratio, Continuity, and Diode.

### Mx-B Scaling



For Mx-B scaling, the result is the measurement multiplied by the **Gain (M)** value minus the **Offset (B)** value.

The **User Units** softkey allows you to specify the custom alphanumeric label of up to four characters (for example, RPM or °C) for Mx-B scaled measurements.

Mx-B scaling applies to all measurement functions except Ratio, Continuity, and Diode.

# Math - Smoothing

(34465A/70A only) Smoothing uses a moving average (boxcar) filter to reduce random noise in measurements. Smoothing is intended to average out small variations in the measurements. Larger variations will cause the filter to reset.



Press **Response** to select **Slow** (100 readings), **Medium** (50 readings), or **Fast** (10 readings) to average.



The smoothing filter applies to all measurement functions except Digitizing, Data Logging, Continuity, Diode, and Probe Hold.

The smoothing filter starts out from a reset condition (no readings in the filter) and is reset if the measurement function is changed or if a reading is too far beyond the current average. After the filter is reset, the reading is the average of all readings up to the specified response (10, 50, 100). At that point, the reading is the moving average of the last 10 (Fast), 50 (Medium), or 100 (Slow) readings. Equal weighting is applied to all readings in the average.

The **Filter** icon (top, right-side of the display) indicates the variation of readings, the amount of allowable readings in the filter, and when the filter is reset as follows:

- Too great of reading variation will constantly reset the filter and the filter icon will be solid yellow (
   Filter).
- As the filter fills with readings, that are within the allowable variation from the readings already in the filter, the filter icon will turn green progressively from left to right( Filter -> Filter).
- A single reading, that is beyond the allowable variation from the readings in the filter, will reset the filter and set the filter icon to solid yellow (**Filter**).
- If all readings are within the allowable variation from the readings in the filter, the filter icon will be solid green (**Filter**).

### Math - Statistics

As the instrument takes measurements, it automatically calculates statistics on those measurements.

#### Front Panel Menus

The statistics menu is accessed from the third softkey in the [Math] menu.



For accurate displayed statistics of AC measurements in Front Panel mode, the default manual trigger delay ([Acquire] > Delay Man) must be used.

The first softkey on this menu (shown below) hides or shows the statistics below the data display (number, bar meter, trend chart (not available on the 34460A), or histogram).



The average and standard deviation are not shown if dB or dBm scaling is in use.

#### Remarks

- The **Span** value is the **Max** minus the **Min**.
- Press Clear Readings to clear reading memory and re-start statistics calculation.

### Math - Limits

Limit checking indicates how many samples have exceeded specified limits and visually indicates when the limits are exceeded.

#### Front Panel Menus

The limits menu is accessed from the [Math] menu.



The first softkey enables or disables limits. The second and third softkeys specify the limits either as high and low values or as a span around a center value. For example, a **Low** limit of -4 V and a **High** limit of +7 V are equivalent to a **Center** of 1.5 V and a **Span** of 11 V.


The **Beeper** softkey enables or disables beeping when limits are violated (this also enables or disables the beeper for the other functions that use the beeper - probe hold, diode, continuity, and errors. **Clear Condition** resets the limit borders to green, as described below.

#### **Limit Indications**


The display uses colors to indicate limits and limit violations.

#### Trend Chart (34461A/65A/70A only)

The limit area is shown in light red on the graph. The limit borders are green (shown below) as long as the limits have not been exceeded.



When a limit is exceeded, the border turns red. In the image below, the top border is still green, but the bottom border has changed to red because the trend line has gone into the lower limit area.




The border will remain red even if the trend line moves out of the limit area. When the trend line is within limits, you can reset the borders to green by pressing **Clear Condition**.

Note also that the number of the newest displayed measurement, +09.994 VDC below, indicates whether the measurement is within limits. Because the limit is 10 V, the 9.994 VDC value is shown with the standard background.



In contrast, the 11.083 VDC reading is highlighted in red to indicate that it is outside the limits.




#### Histogram

The same color scheme applies to histograms. In the image below, the green vertical lines that separate the black histogram background from the light red limit areas indicate that limits have not been exceeded.



In the image below, the lower (left) limit border is red, indicating that the lower limit has been exceeded. (The reading in the upper left corner (-01.68487 VDC) is within limits, so it is not red.)




#### **Bar Meter**

The bar meter (below) uses the same color scheme. The green limit border on the left indicates that the lower limit has not been exceeded, and the red limit border on the right indicates that the upper limit has been exceeded. The numbers 0 and 259 below the light red limit areas indicate how many times each limit has been exceeded, and the word FAIL indicates that a limit has been exceeded.



#### Number

The bright red color (shown below) indicates that the displayed measurement exceeds the limits. The **Number** display also indicates how many times the limits have been exceeded.





By default, the instrument displays readings as a number:



## Adding a Label

The **Label** softkey allows you to add a large text label on the screen. For example, you can use this to indicate what measurement is being taken by the DMM.




To enter the text, press **Label Text** and use the softkeys and front panel arrow keys to modify the label (below). Then press **Done**. The label's font automatically shrinks to accommodate longer labels.



## Selecting a Secondary Measurement

Press **2nd Meas** to select and display a secondary measurement. For example, for the DCV measurement function, you can select ACV, Peak, or Pre-Math as the secondary measurement function. 

The **Auto** softkey specifies that the number of digits displayed is based on other function-specific settings, such as the measurement aperture, set in NPLCs. Measurements are always rounded, never truncated.





# Bar Meter

The bar meter (below) adds a moving bar below the standard Number display.



The **Display** and **Digit Mask** softkeys behave as they do in the **Number** display.



The **Scale** softkey specifies the horizontal scale:




- **Default** sets the scale to equal the measurement range.
- Manual allows you to configure the scale either as High and Low values or as a Span around a Center value. For example, a scale that goes from a Low of -500  $\Omega$  to a High of 1000  $\Omega$  could also be specified as a Center of 250  $\Omega$  with a Span of 1500  $\Omega$ .



#### Selecting a Secondary Measurement

Press **2nd Meas** to select and display a secondary measurement. For example, for the DCV measurement function, you can select ACV, Peak, or Pre-Math as the secondary measurement function. With ACV selected as secondary, the display shows the DCV measurement as a number near to top of the display, DCV in the bar meter, and the ACV measurement above the bar meter:


## Trend Chart (Continuous Measurement Mode)

This topic describes trend chart behavior for the 34461A/65A/70A only, in Continuous measurement mode. The trend chart is not available for the 34460A.

To select the trend chart, press [Display] followed by the Display softkey:



In the Continuous measurement mode, the trend chart shows data trends over time:



Data is collected and displayed in pixel columns as described below.

### Recent/All

The **Recent/All** softkey shows either all of the data in the trend chart (**All**) or just the most recent data (**Recent**). Neither selection clears reading memory.

In All mode, the trend chart displays all readings being taken and builds from left to right. After the display is filled, the data becomes compressed on the left side of the display as new data is added on the right side of the display.


In Recent mode, the trend chart displays data taken during a specified amount of time. For the 34465A/70A, this time is selected with the **Time Window** softkey (1 minute to 1 hour). For the 34461A, this time is fixed at 1 minute, and there is no **Time Window** softkey. Changing this setting clears the trend chart but does not clear reading memory, statistics or histogram data.

#### **Pixel Columns**


The trend chart display area is 400 pixels wide by 147 pixels high. A pixel column is 1 pixel wide by 147 pixels high. Each pixel column on the trend chart display represents 1/400 of the Time Window value; the Time Window setting determines the amount of time represented by each pixel column as follows:

- 1 Minute = 150 ms per pixel column this time is used for the 34461A's Recent mode, and the All mode (34461A/65A/70A)
- 5 Minutes = 750 ms per pixel column (34465A/70A only)
- 10 Minutes = 1.5 s per pixel column (34465A/70A only)
- 30 Minutes = 4.5 s per pixel column (34465A/70A only)
- 1 Hour = 9 s per pixel column (34465A/70A only)

When the reading rate is faster than the time per each pixel column, the column will represent multiple readings. In this situation, the trend chart draws a vertical line in each pixel column showing the maximum to minimum measurement values acquired during that time period:



When the reading rate is slower than the time per pixel column, some pixel columns may represent no readings. In this situation, the trend chart continues with a horizontal line across the pixel:




#### Scaling

The **Vertical Scale** softkey specifies how the current vertical scale is determined.

#### Features and Functions



Press Vertical, to change the scaling:



- Default sets the scale to equal the measurement range.
- Auto automatically adjusts the scale to appropriately fit the line currently shown on the screen.
- Manual allows you to configure the scale either as High and Low values or as a Span around a Center value. For example, a scale from a Low of 0 V to a High of 5 V is equivalent to a Center of 2.5 V and a Span of 5 V.



If you have enabled limits, the (Limits) softkey also appears. This sets the vertical scale to match the limits.


## Trend Chart - Digitize Mode

When the 34465A/70A DMM is in digitize mode (DIG option required), Zoom, Pan, and Cursor trend chart controls are available. To enter digitize mode, press [Acquire] > Acquire softkey > Digitize.


To select the trend chart, press [Display] followed by the Display softkey:



In the digitize mode, these trend chart softkeys are available:




**Zoom** - Sets the horizontal axis zoom percentage. Press **Zoom** and use the up/down arrow keys to select the amount of zoom, in percent. 100% is the maximum amount of zoom with a maximum of one reading shown per display pixel column. The display is 400 pixels wide. You can select a zoom percentage of 1%, 2%, 5%, 10%, 20%, 50%, or 100%. For example, the graphic above shows 5% zoom and the graphic below shows the same signal at 100% zoom:




**Pan** - Selects which reading in memory is displayed at the center of the screen. Use the up or right arrow key to increase the reading number displayed - this causes the graph data to move to the left. Use the down or left arrow key to decrease the reading number displayed - this causes the graph data to move to the right.

Press and release an arrow key to move the cursor one display pixel. Hold down an arrow key to move the cursor in 20 pixel increments. The number of readings represented per pixel depends on the zoom percentage.



**Tip:** Zoom to 100% to pan one reading at a time. After selecting a reading, you can then decrease the zoom, if necessary, to view the surrounding signal.

Cursors - Display and control X1, X2, Y1, Y2, and tracking cursors (shown as lines) on the trend chart.



X cursors are vertical lines along the sample or time axis. Use the up or right arrow key to move the cursor to the right; the down or left arrow key to move the cursor to the left. Press and release an arrow key to move the cursor one display pixel. Hold down an arrow key to move the cursor in 10 pixel increments. Y cursors are horizontal lines along the measurement (magnitude) axis in units of the selected measurement (DCV or DCI). Use the left and or right arrow keys to select a digit of magnitude displayed above the Y1 or Y2 softkey. You can then use the up or down arrows keys to increment/decrement the digit and move the cursor up or down by that amount. Cursor X1 and Y1 are violet; cursor X2 and Y2 are green.

Press Cursors > Cursors to display the choices:



**X Only** – Displays only the X1 and X2 cursors. In this mode, these softkeys are available:

- X1 Use the arrow keys to control the X1 cursor.
- X2 Use the arrow keys to control the X2 cursor.
- AX Lock When ON, keeps the X cursors a fixed distance apart as either cursor is moved.

Y Only – Displays only the Y1 and Y2 cursors. In this mode, these softkeys are available:


- Y1 Use the arrow keys to control the Y1 cursor.
- Y2 Use the arrow keys to control the Y2 cursor.
- ΔY Lock When ON, keeps the Y cursors a fixed distance apart as either cursor is moved.
- Place Yn on Screen Press Y1 or Y2 followed by this softkey to set the cursor to a value that puts it into view on the chart.

X and Y - Displays the X1, X2, Y1 and Y2 cursors. In this mode, these softkeys are available:

#### Features and Functions

- X1 Use the arrow keys to control the X1 cursor.
- X2 Use the arrow keys to control the X2 cursor.
- Y1 Use the arrow keys to control the Y1 cursor.
- Y2 Use the arrow keys to control the Y2 cursor.

**Track Rdng at X** - Select two readings, by reading number, using X1 and X2 softkeys to display X (time) and Y (magnitude) values for each reading, and the delta X and delta Y values.



#### In the graphic above:

- 1 Y1 cursor tracks X1 cursor position.
- Y2 cursor tracks X2 cursor position.
- Cursor time and amplitude information,  $\Delta X$ ,  $\Delta Y$ .
- Press X1 or X2 to display reading number.

These softkeys are available for **Track Rdng at X** mode:

- X1 Use the arrow keys to control the X1 cursor.
- X2 Use the arrow keys to control the X2 cursor.
- AX Lock When ON, keeps the X cursors a fixed distance apart as either cursor is moved.

**Tip:** To record the X and Y data and the delta X and Y data as a screen shot, take a screen shot of the Web UI, not the front panel screen shot utility.

#### Trend Chart - Data Log Mode

This topic applies only to the 34465A/70 DMMs, data logging is standard for these DMMs. See Data Logging for more information on how to configure data logging.

When the DMM is in data log mode, Zoom, Pan, and Cursor trend chart controls are available. To enter data log mode, press [Acquire] > Acquire softkey > Data Log.


To select the trend chart, press [Display] followed by the Display softkey:



In the data log mode, trend chart behavior depends on whether you are data logging to instrument memory, or data logging to a file(s).

### Data Logging to Memory


When data logging to memory, the trend chart maps each reading to a dot in a pixel column, draws a line between multiple dots in each column, and draws a line from the last reading in a column to the first reading in the next column.



When data logging to memory, Zoom, Pan, and Cursors are available and operate as described above in the digitize section.

#### Data Logging to File(s)

When data logging to files, the trend chart behaves in a manner similar to that of the continuous measurement mode. That is, the number of readings shown per pixel column depends on the reading rate and the selected Time Window.



Zoom, Pan, and Cursors are not available when data logging to files. Refer to Trend Chart (Continuous Measurement Mode) for more information.



# Histogram

The histogram shows measurement data as a graphical representation of the distribution of measurement data. Data is grouped in bins represented by vertical bars in the histogram display.



Autoranging can adversely affect the histogram display when measuring repetitive signals spanning multiple ranges. To avoid this, select a fixed range when using the histogram display.


### **Selecting the Display**

Pressing the Display key, followed by the Display softkey allows you to select the display type:



#### **Binning**


The **Binning** softkey allows you to either let the instrument control how the histogram is binned (automatic binning), or to manually specify the binning parameters with the **Bin Settings** softkey. Changing any binning parameter, or switching between automatic and manual binning, will automatically start the histogram over with new data. On the 34461A/65A/70A, this also resets the trend chart.




For **Binning Auto**, the algorithm starts by continuously readjusting the histogram span based on the readings coming in, completely re-binning the data whenever a new value comes in outside of the current span. After acquiring a large number of readings, a new reading outside of the range causes the bins to be compressed by a factor of two such that the new bin range will cover the new reading. The number of bins shown is a function of the number of readings received: 0 to 100 readings = 10 bins, 101 to 500 readings = 20 bins, 501 to 1000 readings = 40 bins, 1001 to 5000 readings = 100 bins, 5001 to 10000 readings = 200 bins, >10000 readings = 400 bins. If the NPLC setting is < 1 PLC, or Aperture Time (34465A/70A only) is < 20 ms, the maximum number of bins is 100.

For **Binning Manual**, you can set number of bins to 10, 20, 40, 100, 200, or 400. You can specify the bin range as either **Low** and **High** values, or as a **Span** around a **Center** value. For example, the histogram range shown above (from -5 to 4 V) could be specified as a **Low** of -5 V and a **High** of 4 V, or a **Center** of -0.5 V and a **Span** of 9 V.


The **Outer Bins** softkey displays two additional bins, for readings above and below the bin range. For example, this image shows the **Outer Bins** softkey set to **Off**.



The image below adds the outer bins to the display. The relatively large number of readings above the bin range (the cyan bar) causes the bars within the bin range to shrink.



The main histogram menu includes a **Cumulative** softkey that hides or shows a line representing the cumulative distribution of the histogram data. Note that this line represents *all* of the data only when the outer bins are shown; if the outer bins are not shown, the outer bin data is not represented in the line. The cumulative distribution line always goes from 0 to 100% on the vertical scale, regardless of the histogram's scale.



The final button on the histogram menu, **Clear Readings**, clears reading memory and starts a new histogram.

### Histogram Data

#### Cursors (34465A/70A only)

Press the **Cursors** softkey (34465A/70A only) to display the histogram cursors.




Cursors in the histogram are specified as bin numbers and display the range of values covered by those bins, the count and the percentage of the total. The total count and percentage of total, as well as the measurement range covered, between the cursor bins, is also displayed. In the graphic below, cursor B1 (violet vertical lines) is positioned on bin number 10 and cursor B2 (green vertical lines) is positioned on bin number 14 (bin number shown above the **B1** softkey). The bin information for cursor B1 is shown in the violet box, the bin information for B2 in the green box. For example, the information in the B1 box is in the graphic below is:

- 2.250 00 k to 2.500 00k Range of frequency measurement values for this bin.
- #29 Number of samples in this bin.
- 11.5% Percentage of the total number of samples in this bin.

The data between the B1 and B2 cursors, including the data in the B1 and B2 bins, is shown to the right of the violet and green boxes. In the graphic below:


- **Span:** The measurement range covered from B1 to B2.
- #178 The number of samples from B1 to B2.
- 70.4% The percentage of the total number of samples from B1 to B2.



When Outer Bins are shown (when using manual binning) a zero cursor value indicates the outlier count below the histogram range, and one plus the number of bins indicates the outlier count above the histogram range.

#### **Histogram with Statistics**

Showing statistics (**Shift > Math > Statistics**) is particularly useful for the histogram display. For example, in the graphic below, the thick blue line is the average, each thin blue line represents one standard deviation from the average.

# Utility - Autocalibration (34465A/70A only)

Autocalibration compensates for drift caused by time and temperature change in DC voltage and resistance measurements, and adjusts some aspects of other measurement functions.

To quickly perform autocalibration without editing the cal string message, press **Shift** > **ACAL** (**Up Arrow**) key.

Use the procedure below to use menus and softkeys to edit the cal string message and perform autocal

Step 1: Press Utility on the front panel.

### Step 2: Press the Test/Admin softkey:




Step 3: Press the Calibrate softkey:



**Step 4:** (Optional step) Press the **Edit Cal String** softkey and enter the information for the cal string message. Common messages include the last calibration date, calibration due date, or calibration department contact information. When finished, press the **Done** softkey

**Step 5:** Press the **Perform Autocal** softkey:





# Utility - Store and Recall State and Preference Files

The Utility menu is shown below.



Press **Store/Recall** to save and recall state and preference files. In general, state files store volatile settings associated with measurements. Preferences are non-volatile parameters associated with the instrument, but not any specific measurement. For details, see the table in the MMEMory State and Preferences Subsystem.



## **Store Settings**

**Store Settings** allows you to browse to a directory and specify a file name, and to choose whether you want to store a state file or a preference file.




Press **Type** to select whether you want to store a state or preferences file, and press **Store State** (shown above) or **Store Pref** (the softkey's label if you are storing preferences) to store the specified file.

**Action** allows you to either store a file or to create a new folder.



# **Recall Settings**

**Recall Settings** allows you to browse to the file to be recalled. Use the arrow keys to navigate to the desired state file (\*.sta) or preferences file (\*.prf).




#### Power On

**Power On** selects the state that is loaded at power-up. This can be either the state when the instrument was powered down with the power switch (**Last**), a user-selected state file (**User Defined**), or the factory default state (**Factory Defaults**).



#### Set to Defaults

**Set to Defaults** loads the instrument's factory default state or preference settings.



# Utility Menu - Manage Files



The **Manage Files** softkey allows you to create, copy, delete, and rename files and folders in the instrument's internal flash memory or on a USB drive attached to the front panel. It also allows you to capture the current screen to either a bitmap (\*.bmp) or portable network graphics (\*.png) file. This is the default option, as shown below.



#### **Action**

**Action** specifies the action to perform. Pressing **Capture Display** saves a screen capture of the display at the moment that you pressed **[Shift]** to go to the **[Utility]** menu.



**Delete** - To delete a file or folder, press **Delete** and **Browse** to the folder or file to delete. Press **Select** > **Perform Delete** > **Done**.


**Folder** - To create a folder, **Browse** to the internal or external location for the folder, press **File Name**, enter a folder name and press **Done**. Press **Create Folder** > **Done**.

**Copy** - To copy a file or folder, press **Copy**. **Browse** to the folder or file to be copied and press **Select**. Press **Copy Path** and select an internal or external path for copying. Press **Perform Copy** > **Done**.

**Rename** - To rename a file or folder, press **Rename**. **Browse** to the folder or file to be renamed and press **Select**. Press **New Name**, enter a new name and press **Done**. Press **Perform Rename** > **Done**.

#### **Browse**

**Browse** selects the file or folder upon which the action will be performed.



Use the front panel arrows and [Select] key to navigate through the list, and press Select or Cancel to exit the browse window. The left and right arrows contract or expand a folder to hide or show its files.

## File Name

**File Name** allows you to use the front panel arrows, the **[Select]** key, and the softkeys to enter a file name. Use the front panel arrows to point to a letter, and **Previous Char** and **Next Char** to move the cursor in the area where the name is entered. In the image below, there is no **Next Char** softkey because the cursor is at the end.



Press [Done] or [Cancel] to finish.

# Utility Menu - I/O Configuration



**I/O Config** configures the I/O parameters for remote operations over the LAN (optional on 34460A), USB, or GPIB (optional) interface.



**LAN** enables and disables the instrument's LAN interface, and **LAN Reset** resets the LAN using its current settings and enables DHCP and mDNS. The **LAN Reset** softkey also clears any user-defined Web Interface password.

### **LAN Settings**

**LAN Settings** opens the menu shown below. **Set to Defaults** resets the LAN settings to their default values.



#### **Modify Settings**

**Modify Settings** enables DHCP or Manual (Auto-IP) assignment of the instrument's IP address. It also enables configuration of network parameters based on the protocol (DHCP or Manual) selected.



For example, press **Host Name** or **Service mDNS** to modify the instrument's host name or mDNS Service Name, shown below.



#### **LAN Services**

LAN Services enables and disables the LAN services shown below.



After enabling/disabling one or more services, press **Done > Apply Changes**. After that, you must cycle instrument power for the new settings to take effect.

The Web server enables or disables instrument programming from the instrument's Web interface.

The multicast DNS (mDNS) service is for use in networks where no conventional DNS server is installed. Cycling power or resetting the LAN always enables mDNS.

The instrument Telnet port is 5024. Open SCPI sessions on the Telnet connection by entering:

telnet IP address 5024

Refer to the Keysight IO Libraries help for information on the VXI-11, Sockets, and HiSLIP protocols.

### **USB Settings**

**USB Settings** configures the front panel USB (storage) and rear-panel USB (connectivity) connectors.




The SEC licensed option also gives you the ability to enable or disable the front panel USB interface via a USB Front softkey. This option can be ordered as factory option or as customer-installable option. See Models and Options for details. Without this option, the front panel USB interface is always enabled.

#### **USB SCPI**

**USB SCPI** enables or disables the rear-panel USB control port. After changing the interface state, cycle instrument power to make the change take effect. When disabled, the interface cannot be configured by the Keysight IO Libraries Connection Expert utility.

#### Easy File Access (File Access Softkey)

**Easy File Access** uses media transfer protocol (MTP) to easily download instrument files to your PC. Simply connect the rear-panel USB port on the instrument to a USB port on your PC. The DMM will appear as a read-only drive on your PC's file system.



You can use your PC's standard file management features to copy files from the DMM to your PC.

To use **Easy File Access** at the same time that you are remotely programming the instrument with SCPI over the USB interface (**USB SCPI**), you must have Keysight IO Libraries Suite 16.3 or later installed on your PC. You may download the latest version at <a href="https://www.keysight.com/find/iosuite">www.keysight.com/find/iosuite</a>.

To use **Easy File Access** on a PC running the Windows XP operating system, make sure you have Microsoft Windows Media Player 11 for Windows XP SP1, or are using a Microsoft Windows XP SP2, SP3, or a newer version of Windows. You may download this software at <a href="https://www.microsoft.com/en-us/-download/details.aspx?id=8163">www.microsoft.com/en-us/-download/details.aspx?id=8163</a>.

## **GPIB Settings (optional)**

GPIB Settings enables or disables your instrument's GPIB interface.

When disabled, the interface cannot be configured by the Keysight IO Libraries Connection Expert utility.

You can also set GPIB address to a value from 0 to 30. After enabling or disabling GPIB or changing the address, cycle instrument power for the change to take effect.



## Utility Menu - Test/Admin




Test/Admin provides access to self-test, calibration, and administrative functions:




#### Self-Test

**Self-Test** verifies proper instrument operation. See <u>Self-Test Procedures</u> for details, and always safely disconnect inputs to the DMM terminals before running the Full Test.



#### Calibrate

Calibrate accesses the instrument calibration procedure. See Calibration for details.



### Security


**Security** manages the secure code and security features. If you have the SEC option, you must enter the Secure Code to configure some features.

**NISPOM Sanitize** sanitizes all user-accessible instrument memory except for the calibration constants and reboots the instrument. This complies with requirements in chapter 8 of the National Industrial Security Program Operating Manual (NISPOM).



The **NISPOM Sanitize** softkey and the SYSTem:SECurity:IMMEdiate command are equivalent. They are for customers, such as military contractors, who must comply with NISPOM.

This feature destroys all user-defined state information, measurement data, and user-defined I/O settings such as the IP address. This feature is not recommended for use in routine applications because of the possibility of unintended data loss.



#### Install License

**Install License** enables licensed instrument features. For information on obtaining licenses, go to www.keysight.com/find/truevolt.

After receiving a license file from Keysight, use the following procedure to install the license:

- 1. Save the license file to a USB drive and connect the USB drive to the DMM's front panel USB connector.
- Press [Shift] > [Utility] > Test/Admin > Install License.
- 3. Use the front panel arrow keys to navigate to the license file location and press **Select**.
- 4. Upon successful license installation, the DMM displays License Installation Successful.

## Firmware Update

Firmware Update updates the instrument firmware to a new version. See Firmware Update for details.

## Utility Menu - System Setup



System Setup configures user preferences, sets the date and time, and sets a power-on message.



## **User Settings**

**User Settings** specifies user preferences that control how you interact with the instrument. These settings are stored in non-volatile memory and can be saved in a preferences (.prf) file.



## Help Language

**Help Lang** selects the help language for front panel use: English, French, German, Japanese, Korean, Russian, or Simplified Chinese. All messages, context-sensitive help, and help topics appear in the selected language. The softkey labels are always in English.

#### **Number Format**

**Number Format** specifies how numbers are displayed on the front panel: 12,345.6 or 12.345,6. Other possibilities also exist. For example, you can use the space as a separator.



#### Sounds



Disables or enables the click heard when a front panel key or softkey is pressed.

Also enables or disables the audible tone (Beeper On or Off) associated with the following features:

- Limits a measurement limit is exceeded (if limits are enabled)
- Probe Hold the measured signal records a stable reading
- Diode the forward bias voltage is between 0.3 and 0.8 V
- Continuity a short is measured (less than or equal to  $10 \Omega$ )
- Error an error is generated from the front panel or remote interface

#### Features and Functions

This non-volatile setting appears in several different menus on the front panel. Turning the beeper on or off in one menu affects all of the other menus and functions. For example, turning the beeper off for probe hold, also turns the beeper off for limits, diode, continuity, and errors.

## **Display Options**

**Display Options** configures the display.



You can enable or disable the display, adjust the brightness (10 to 100%), enable or disable the screen saver, and pick a color scheme. If you turn off the display, press any front panel key to turn it on again.

By default, the screen saver turns off and blanks the screen after eight hours of inactivity. You may disable this screen saver from the front panel only.

The display is enabled when power is cycled, after an instrument reset (\*RST), or when you return to local (front panel) operation. Press the **[Local]** key or execute the IEEE-488 GTL (Go To Local) command from the remote interface to return to the local state.

#### **SCPI ID**

**SCPI ID** determines the instrument's response to a \*IDN? query. Choices for each DMM model are:

- 34460A 34460A, AT34460A, HP34401A
- 34461A 34461A, AT34461A, HP34401A
- 34465A 34465A, AT34410A, AT34411A
- **34470A** 34470A, AT34410A, AT34411A

Choices above with no prefix (34460A, for example) return Keysight Technologies as the manufacturer. Choices above with an AT or HP prefix, return Agilent Technologies or Hewlett Packard, respectively, as the manufacturer. These choices are included for \*IDN? compatibility with existing programs that expect \*IDN? to return a particular manufacturer and model number.

If you have an older Agilent 34460A or 34461A and upgrade to the new (Keysight) firmware, your instrument continues to respond with the manufacturer name "Agilent", not "Keysight" until you set the front panel SCPI ID to 34460A or 34461A, send the SYST:IDEN DEF command, or reset user preferences. After doing this, the instrument responds with "Keysight" as the manufacturer.

Important: In order to update the instrument firmware from remote, the model number in the \*IDN? response must match the actual instrument model number. If you have changed the instrument's \*IDN? response to another instrument, when attempting to update the firmware from remote, you will see this error: The instrument is not supported by this firmware file. To update the firmware, either update using the front panel procedure or, from remote, use SYSTem:IDENtify to set the \*IDN? to match the actual model number, update the firmware, and then use SYSTem:IDENtify again to set the \*IDN? response to the other model number.

#### Date / Time

**Date / Time** sets the instrument's real-time clock, which always uses a 24-hour format (00:00:00 to 23:59:59). There is no automatic setting of the date and time, such as to adjust for daylight savings time. Use the front panel arrow keys to set the year, month, day, hour, and minute.



### **Power on Message**

**Power on Message** sets a message that is displayed when the instrument powers up and when you press [Help] > About.



Use the front panel arrows and **[Select]** key to select the letters. Then press **Done** to exit and save the message. The message will appear as shown below when you turn the instrument on or press **[Help]** > **About**.



## Web Interface


The Keysight Truevolt Series DMMs include a built-in Web Interface for monitoring and controlling the instrument via a Web browser. To begin, connect your instrument to the LAN and enter the instrument's IP address into the address bar at the top of your PC's Web browser, or select the instrument in Connection Expert and click the **Instrument Web Interface...** button. The Web Interface will appear in the browser as shown below (34465A DMM shown).

The following is a high-level overview of the four Web Interface tabs shown on the left side of the

The Welcome Page displays basic instrument information. To change any of the information displayed on this page, use the Configuration Page.





# Instrument Monitor and Control Page

This page allows you to monitor and control the DMM. This page opens in the *Observe Only* mode and automatically opens the Monitor DMM window (described below). In *Observe Only* mode, the instrument control settings are grayed out (disabled). This mode allows you to keep track of DMM operations remotely. The **About** section shows installed licenses, the instrument firmware revision, and the instrument serial number.


In *Allow Full Control* mode, this window configures the instrument and takes measurements. Simply select the DMM settings and click **Apply**.



The six buttons along the top of the screen are described below.

#### **Monitor DMM**

When the main page is set to *Observe Only* mode, this window opens showing a textual display of DMM readings, secondary measurements (if enabled), and statistics. In *Allow Full Control* mode, the **Clear All** and, if applicable, **Clear Peaks** buttons become active:



In *Allow Full Control* mode, to view data as shown on the instrument's graphical display (trend chart, histogram, and so on), click the **Graphics Display** radio button and click **Get Display Image** to update the graphical display:




#### View Data

For both the *Observe Only* and *Allow Full Control* modes, this window keeps a running display of **Readings in Memory** and has these active controls:

- Last Value Click Last Value > Get Data to display the last reading taken by the DMM.
- Statistics Data Click Statistics Data > Get Data to display Maximum, Average, Minimum, Max-Min, Standard Deviation, and Samples (number of readings).
- **Histogram Data** Click **Histogram Data** > **Get Data** to display Reading Count, Auto Bin (On or OFF), Number of Bins, Upper Range, Lower Range, and Bin Data.

For the Allow Full Control mode, this window has these additional controls:


- Read and Remove Readings The Start Index is fixed at 1. Enter the number of Readings to
  Remove and click Get Data to display those readings at the bottom of the window. The readings displayed ARE cleared from instrument memory.
- Delete All Readings Deletes all readings in the instrument reading memory and does not display
  any readings.



#### **DMM Overview**


This window generates reports with information such as the instrument's firmware, configuration, calibration, SCPI configuration, and error queue. Check the desired boxes on the left side of the screen and then click **Generate Report**. The **Change in SCPI Configuration** box produces a list of all of the SCPI

commands required to change the instrument state since the last time a report was generated. This provides a convenient way for you to learn SCPI syntax.



#### Store/Recall


In the Allow Full Control mode, this window saves, recalls, and deletes instrument states.



#### **Commands**

In the *Allow Full Control* mode, this window lets you interactively send commands to the DMM and read responses. You can use this to become familiar with the instrument's command set, and to rapidly prototype commands and check responses before writing code. Buttons on the right side of the window send a Device Clear, \*RST, or send and read \*IDN? or SYST:ERR?.

Use the **Enter SCPI command or query** field to enter SCPI commands and click **Send**, to execute the command, **Read** to read back a response, or **Send & Read** to execute the command and read back the response.



#### Run Autocal

In the *Allow Full Control* mode, click the **Run Autocal** button to perform an autocalibration (autocal). During the autocal, this button is grayed-out until the autocal is complete (typically 15 to 20 seconds).

## Configuration Page

The Configuration page allows you to view the instrument's network configuration parameters, which configure the instrument to operate in your environment. To modify a parameter, click **Modify Configuration**.

The parameters on the Current Configuration page are:

#### • IP Address Configuration

If this is set to Automatic, the IP Address, Subnet Mask, and Default Gateway were determined automatically, either from DHCP or if a DHCP server was not found, from Dynamically Configured Link Local Addressing (Auto-IP). If it is set to Manual, the IP Address, Subnet Mask, and Default Gateway were set to the manually configured values.

#### IP Address

This is used for TCP/IP communications with the instrument. The IP Address Configuration indicates how the address was determined.

#### · Subnet Mask

This parameter enables the instrument to determine whether an IP Address is on the same local subnet. When an address is on a different subnet, all packets must be sent to a gateway. The IP Address Configuration (above) indicates how the subnet mask was determined.

#### Default Gateway

This is the IP address of the default gateway that allows the instrument to communicate with devices that are not on the local subnet. Packets that are destined for a device not on the local subnet, as determined by the subnet mask, are sent to the default gateway. The IP Address Configuration (above) indicates how the default gateway was determined.

#### DNS Server(s)


## Thermal EMF Errors

Thermoelectric voltages are the most common error source in low-level DC voltage measurements. Thermoelectric voltages are generated by circuit connections using dissimilar metals at different temperatures. Each metal-to-metal junction forms a thermocouple that generates a voltage proportional to the junction temperature, as shown in the table below. You should minimize thermocouple voltages and temperature variations in low-level voltage measurements. The best connections use copper-to-copper crimped connections, as the DMM's input terminals are a copper alloy.

Copper to:	Approx. μV / °C
Cadmium-Tin Solder	0.2
Copper	<0.3
Gold	0.5
Silver	0.5
Brass	3
Beryllium Copper	5
Aluminum	5
Tin-Lead Solder	5
Kovar or Alloy 42	40
Silicon	500
Copper Oxide	1000

# Loading Errors (DC Voltage)

Measurement loading errors occur when the resistance of the DUT is an appreciable percentage of the multimeter's input resistance, as shown below.



To reduce the effects of loading errors and to minimize noise pickup, set the multimeter's input resistance to >10 G $\Omega$  (high-impedance) for the 100 mVDC, 1 VDC, and 10 VDC ranges. The input resistance is maintained at 10 M $\Omega$  for the 100 VDC and 1000 VDC ranges.

# Noise Rejection


## Rejecting Power-Line Noise Voltages

A desirable characteristic of integrating analog-to-digital (A/D) converters is their ability to reject power-line related noise present with DC input signals. This is called normal mode noise rejection, or NMR. The multimeter achieves NMR by measuring the average DC input by "integrating" it over a fixed period. If you set the integration time to a whole number of power line cycles (PLCs), these errors (and their harmonics) will average out to approximately zero.

The multimeter provides three integration selections (1, 10, and 100 PLCs) that achieve NMR. The multimeter measures the power–line frequency (50 Hz or 60 Hz), and then determines the corresponding integration time. For a complete listing of NMR, approximate added rms noise, reading rate, and resolution for each integration setting, see the Performance vs. Integration Time table.

## Common Mode Rejection (CMR)

Ideally, a multimeter is completely isolated from earth–referenced circuits. However, there is finite resistance between the multimeter's input LO terminal and earth ground, as shown below. This can cause errors when measuring low voltages which are floating relative to earth ground.




## Noise Caused by Magnetic Loops

When making measurements near magnetic fields, avoid inducing voltages in the measurement connections. You should be especially careful when working near conductors carrying large currents. Use twisted-pair connections to the multimeter to reduce the noise pickup loop area, or dress the test leads as close together as possible. Loose or vibrating test leads will also induce error voltages. Tie down test leads securely when operating near magnetic fields. Whenever possible, use magnetic shielding materials or increased distance from magnetic sources.

## Noise Caused by Ground Loops

When measuring voltages in circuits where the multimeter and the DUT are referenced to a common earth ground, a "ground loop" is formed. As shown below, any voltage difference between the two ground reference points (Vground) causes current to flow through the measurement leads. This causes noise and offset voltage (usually power-line related), which are added to the measured voltage.



R<sub>L</sub> = lead resistance

R<sub>i</sub> = multimeter isolation resistance

Vground = voltage drop on ground bus


The best way to eliminate ground loops is to isolate the multimeter from earth by not grounding the input terminals. If the multimeter must be earth–referenced, connect it and the DUT to one common ground point. Also connect the multimeter and DUT to the same electrical outlet whenever possible.

## Resistance Measurement Considerations

The multimeter offers two resistance measurements: 2-wire and 4-wire ohms. For both methods, the test current flows from the input HI terminal, through the resistor being measured. For 2-wire ohms, the voltage drop across the resistor being measured is sensed internal to the multimeter. Therefore, test lead resistance is also measured. For 4-wire ohms, separate "sense" connections are required. Because no current flows in the sense leads, the resistance in these leads does not give a measurement error.

The errors mentioned earlier in this chapter for DC voltage measurements also apply to resistance measurements. Additional error sources unique to resistance measurements are discussed below.

The 4-wire ohms method provides the most accurate way to measure small resistances because it reduces test lead and contact resistances. This is often used in automated test applications where resistive and/or long cable, numerous connections, or switches exist between the multimeter and the DUT. The recommended connections for 4-wire ohms measurements are shown below.



For the 34465A and 34470A, you can also enable offset compensated resistance measurements using [SENSe:]{RESistance|FRESistance}:OCOMpensated {OFF|ON}. Offset compensation removes the effects of small dc voltages in the circuit being measured. The technique involves taking the difference between two resistance measurements, one with the current source set to the normal value, and one with the current source set to a lower value.

## Removing Test Lead Resistance Errors

To eliminate offset errors associated with test lead resistance in 2-wire ohms measurements, follow these steps:

Short the test lead ends together and read the displayed test lead resistance.

Press **Null**. The multimeter will store the test lead resistance as the 2-wire ohms null value, and subtract that value from subsequent measurements.

See also "Null Measurements."

## Minimizing Power Dissipation Effects

When measuring resistors designed for temperature measurements (or other resistive devices with large temperature coefficients), be aware that the multimeter will dissipate some power in the DUT. The following table shows several examples.

If power dissipation is a problem, you should select a higher fixed range (all multimeter models) or, for the 34465A/70A, select the low power resistance measurement mode (see Resistance (front panel), or [SENSe:]{RESistance|FRESistance}:POWer:LIMit[:STATe] (remote). The low power mode sources less test current per measurement range than is normally sourced for standard resistance measurements, to reduce power dissipation and self-heating in the DUT. The following table shows the various resistance ranges, the standard test current delivered for 2- and 4-wire resistance measurements, and the low power mode test current.

## Errors in High Resistance Measurements

When you are measuring large resistances, significant errors can occur due to insulation resistance and surface cleanliness. You should take the necessary precautions to maintain a "clean" high-resistance system. Test leads and fixtures are susceptible to leakage due to moisture absorption in insulating materials and "dirty" surface films. Nylon and PVC are relatively poor insulators ( $10^9 \Omega$ ) when compared to PTFE insulators ( $10^{13} \Omega$ ). Leakage from nylon or PVC insulators can easily contribute a 0.1% error when measuring a 1 MO resistance in humid conditions.

## True RMS AC Measurements

True rms responding multimeters, like the Keysight True*volt* Series, measure the "heating" potential of an applied voltage. Power dissipated in a resistor is proportional to the square of an applied voltage, independent of the waveshape of the signal. This multimeter accurately measures true rms voltage or current, as long as the wave shape contains negligible energy above the meter's effective bandwidth.

The Keysight Truevolt Series uses the same techniques to measure true rms voltage and true rms current. The effective AC voltage bandwidth is 300 kHz, while the effective AC current bandwidth is 10 kHz.

The DMM's AC voltage and AC current functions measure the AC-coupled true rms value. In this DMM, the "heating value" of only the AC components of the input waveform are measured (dc is rejected). As seen in the figure above; for sine waves, triangle waves, and square waves, the AC-coupled and AC+DC values are equal, because these waveforms do not contain a DC offset. However, for non-symmetrical waveforms (such as pulse trains) there is a DC voltage content, which is rejected by Keysight's AC-coupled true rms measurements. This can provide a significant benefit.

An AC-coupled true rms measurement is desirable when you are measuring small AC signals in the presence of large DC offsets. For example, this situation is common when measuring AC ripple present on DC power supplies. There are situations, however, where you might want to know the AC+DC true rms value. You can determine this value by combining results from DC and AC measurements, as shown below:

$$ac + dc = \sqrt{ac^2 + dc^2}$$

For the best AC noise rejection, you should perform the DC measurement using an integration time of at least 10 power-line cycles (PLCs).

## True RMS Accuracy and High–Frequency Signal Content

A common misconception is that because an AC multimeter is true rms, its sine wave accuracy specifications apply to all waveforms. Actually, the shape of the input signal dramatically affects measurement accuracy for any multimeter, especially when that input signal contains high-frequency the instrument's bandwidth.

For example, consider a pulse train, one of the most challenging waveforms for a multimeter. The pulse width of that waveform largely determines its high–frequency content. The frequency spectrum of an individual pulse is determined by its Fourier Integral. The frequency spectrum of the pulse train is the Fourier Series that samples along the Fourier Integral at multiples of the input pulse repetition frequency (prf).


The figure below shows the Fourier Integral of two very different pulses: one of broad width (200 μs); the other narrow (6.7 μs). The bandwidth of the ACV path in the DMM is 300 kHZ; therefore, frequency content above 300 kHz is not measured.

Notice that the  $\sin(\pi fT)/\pi fT$  spectrum of the narrow pulse significantly exceeds the effective bandwidth of the instrument. The net result is a less accurate measurement of the narrow, high-frequency pulse.

In contrast, the frequency spectrum of the broad pulse has fallen off significantly below the multimeter's 300 kHz (approximately) bandwidth, so measurements of this pulse are more accurate.

Reducing the prf increases the density of lines in the Fourier spectrum, and increases the portion of the input signal's spectral energy within the multimeter's bandwidth, which improves accuracy.

In summary, error in rms measurements arise when there is significant input signal energy at frequencies above the multimeter's bandwidth.



## Estimating High-Frequency (Out-of-Band) Error

A common way to describe signal waveshapes is to refer to their "Crest Factor". Crest factor is the ratio of the peak value to rms value of a waveform. For a pulse train, for example, the crest factor is approximately equal to the square root of the inverse of the duty cycle.

$$CF = \frac{1}{\sqrt{d}} = \frac{1}{\sqrt{\frac{t_p}{T}}} = \frac{1}{\sqrt{prf \times t_p}}$$

Notice that crest factor is a composite parameter, dependent upon the pulse width and repetition frequency; crest factor alone is not enough to characterize the frequency content of a signal.

Traditionally, DMMs include a crest factor derating table that applies at all frequencies. The measurement algorithm used in the Truevolt Series DMMs is not inherently sensitive to crest factor, so no such derating is necessary. With this multimeter, as discussed in the previous section, the focal issue is high-frequency signal content which exceeds the multimeter's bandwidth.

For periodic signals, the combination of crest factor and repetition rate can suggest the amount of high-frequency content and associated measurement error. The first zero crossing of a simple pulse occurs at  $f_1 = 1/t_p$ .

This gives an immediate impression of the high-frequency content by identifying where this crossing occurs as a function of crest factor:  $f_1=(CF^2)(prf)$ .

The following table shows the typical error for various pulse waveforms as a function of input pulse frequency:

This table gives an additional error for each waveform, to be added to the value from the accuracy table provided in the instrument's data sheet

The specifications are valid for CF ≤ 10, provided there is insignificant signal energy above the 300 kHz bandwidth for voltage, or the 10 kHz bandwidth for current. Multimeter performance is not specified for CF > 10, or when significant out-of-band signal content is present.

## Example

A pulse train with level 1 Vrms, is measured on the 1 V range. It has pulse heights of 3 V (that is, a Crest Factor of 3) and duration 111  $\mu$ s. The prf can be calculated to be 1000 Hz, as follows:

$$prf = \frac{1}{CF^2 \times t_p}$$

Thus, from the table above, this AC waveform can be measured with 0.18 percent additional error.


# Other Primary Measurement Functions

# Frequency and Period Measurement Errors

The multimeter uses a reciprocal counting technique to measure frequency and period. This method generates constant measurement resolution for any input frequency. The multimeter's AC voltage measurement section performs input signal conditioning. All frequency counters are susceptible to errors when measuring low-voltage, low-frequency signals. The effects of both internal noise and external noise pickup are critical when measuring "slow" signals. The error is inversely proportional to frequency. Measurement errors also occur if you attempt to measure the frequency (or period) of an input following a DC offset voltage change. You must allow the multimeter's input DC blocking capacitor to fully settle before making frequency measurements.

## DC Current

When you connect the multimeter in series with a test circuit to measure current, a measurement error is introduced. The error is caused by the multimeter's series burden voltage. A voltage is developed across the wiring resistance and current shunt resistance of the multimeter, as shown below.



Rs = DUT source resistance

V<sub>b</sub> = multimeter burden voltage

R = multimeter current shunt

Error ( % ) = 
$$\frac{-100\% \ x \ V_b}{V_s}$$

## Avoid applying signals to unused current input terminals

If signal inputs are applied to terminals not needed for the current measurement, measurement errors may occur. The unused terminals are still protected but the un-needed signals may interfere with current measurement. For example, applying inputs to the 3A terminals while making measurements on the 10A terminals will typically cause errors.

The Hi and Lo sense terminals are not used for many measurements. Applying signals here when not needed can also cause errors. AC or DC voltages above 15 volts peak on the un-needed sense terminals are likely to cause measurement errors. If unexpected errors are occurring, signals on the un-needed terminals is an area to check.

## Temperature Measurements

Temperature measurements require a temperature transducer probe. The supported probes are 2-wire and 4-wire RTDs, 2-wire and 4-wire thermistors (5 k 44007 type, see Thermistor Requirements below), and, for the 34465A/70A only, type E, J, K, N, R, or T thermocouples.

## **Probe Type Choice**

RTD's provide very accurate, highly linear relationships between resistance and temperature, over a range of roughly –200 to 500 °C. There is very little conversion complexity for an RTD because it is so intrinsically linear. The multimeter provides measurement for the IEC751 standard RTD, which has a sensitivity of 0.385%/°C.

Thermistors consist of semiconductor materials, and provide roughly ten times the sensitivity of the RTD. Because they are semiconductors, their temperature range is more limited, commonly to –80 to 150 °C. Thermistors have highly non–linear temperature–resistance relationships; therefore their conversion algorithms are more complex. The Truevolt Series multimeters use the standard Hart–Steinhart Approximation to provide accurate conversions, with a typical resolution of .08 °C.

## Thermistor Requirements

The DMM converts the measured thermistor resistance to temperature using the Steinhart-Hart thermistor equation:

$$1/T = A + B (Ln(R)) + C (Ln(R))^3$$

#### Where:

A, B, and C are constants provided by the thermistor manufacturer and derived from three temperature test points.

 $R = Thermistor resistance in \Omega$ .

T = Temperature in degrees K.

**Important:** Use only a 5 k $\Omega$  44007-type thermistor. This type thermistor has constants of A = 1.285e-3, B = 2.362e-4, C = 9.285e-8. Using an incorrect type of thermistor can result in errors greater than 20 °C for a temperature being measured of 100 °C.

## 2-Wire vs. 4-Wire Measurements

As with resistance measurements, four-wire temperature measurements are more accurate, because errors due to lead wire resistance are completely eliminated. Alternately, you can use the multimeter's Null function to remove the test lead resistance from the measurement (see NULL Reading below).

## **NULL Reading**

The DMM allows a separate null setting to be saved for the temperature function. When making null measurements, each reading is the difference between a stored null value and the input signal. One application of NULL is to increase accuracy of two-wire resistance measurements by first nulling the closed-circuit test lead resistance.

### Autozero On/Off

Enabling the autozero feature (ON) provides greater accuracy; however, the additional measurement (of zero) reduces the reading speed.

# Making High-Speed AC Measurements

The multimeter's AC voltage and AC current functions implement three low–frequency filters. These filters allow you to trade–off minimum measured frequency for faster reading speed. The FAST filter settles in 0.025 seconds, and is useful for frequencies above 200 Hz. The MEDIUM filter settles in 0.625 seconds for voltage and 0.25 seconds for current, and is useful for measurements above 20 Hz. The SLOW filter settles in 2.5 seconds for voltage and 1.66 seconds for current, and is useful for frequencies above 3 Hz.

With a few precautions, you can perform AC measurements at speeds up to 500 readings per second. Use manual ranging to eliminate autoranging delays. By setting the trigger delay to 0, the FAST, MEDIUM, and SLOW filters allow up to 500, 150, and 50 readings per second, but with reduced accuracy because the filter may not fully settle. If the sample-to-sample levels are similar, little settling time is required for each new reading. Under this specialized condition, the MEDIUM filter provides reduced accuracy results at 20 readings per second, and the FAST filter provides reduced accuracy results at 200 readings per second.

In applications where sample-to-sample levels vary widely, but the DC offset level does not change, the MEDIUM filter settles at 2 to 4 readings per second (depending upon the lowest frequency component in the waveform) as shown in the following table:

<b>Lowest Frequency Component</b>	20 Hz	50 Hz	100 Hz	200 Hz
AC Current (allowable rate in rdgs/s)	4	4	4	4
AC Voltage (allowable rate in rdgs/s)	2	3	4	4

For AC voltage, additional settling time may be required when the DC level varies from sample to sample. The default sample delays allow for a DC level change of 3% of range for all filters. If the DC level change exceeds these levels, additional settling time is required. The multimeter's DC blocking circuitry has a settling time constant of 0.2 seconds. This settling time only affects measurement accuracy when DC offset levels vary from sample to sample. If maximum measurement speed is desired, you may want to add an

external DC blocking circuit for circuitry with significant DC voltages present. This circuit can be as simple as a resistor and a capacitor.

For AC current, additional settling time is not required when the DC level varies sample to sample.

# Making High-Speed DC and Resistance Measurements


If you have the DIG (digitizing) option, simply select [Acquire] > Digitize to select the fastest DCV or DCI measurements. If you do not have the DIG option, or for resistance measurements, to make the fastest (but least accurate) DC or resistance measurements:

- Set the integration time (NPLC or aperture) to minimum
- Select a fixed range (autorange off)
- Disable autozero
- Disable offset compensation (resistance measurements)


Refer to the particular measurement type in Measurements for more information on the above functions.

# Capacitance

The multimeter makes capacitance measurements by applying a known current to charge the capacitance and then a resistance to discharge as shown below:



An illustration of the response curve while charging is shown below:



Capacitance is calculated by measuring the change in voltage (DV) that occurs over a "short aperture" time, (Dt). This measurement is repeated at two different times during the exponential rise that occurs. An algorithm takes the data from these four points, and by linearizing that exponential rise over these "short apertures", accurately calculates the capacitance value.

#### Measurement Tutorial

The measurement cycle consists of two parts: a charge phase (shown in the graph) and a discharge phase. The time-constant during the discharge phase is longer, due to a  $100 \text{ k}\Omega$  protective resistor in the measurement path. This time-constant plays an important role in the resultant reading rate (measurement time). The incremental times (or "sample times") as well as the width of the "short apertures", vary by range, in order to minimize noise and increase reading accuracy.

For the best accuracy, take a zero null measurement with open probes, to null out the test lead capacitance, before connecting the probes across the capacitor to be measured (see Capacitance Measurements for details).

## Capacitance Measurement Considerations


Capacitors that have a high dissipation factor or other non-ideal characteristics will affect capacitance measurements. Capacitors with high dissipation factors may exhibit a variance between the measured value using the multimeter versus the single frequency method of some other LCR meters. The single frequency method will also see more variation at different frequencies. For example, some inexpensive capacitance substitution boxes, when measured with the multimeter, are almost 5% different compared to the same capacitance measured with the single frequency method of an LCR meter. The LCR meter will also show different values at different frequencies.

Capacitors with long time constants (dielectric absorption) will result in slow measurement settling time, and will take a number of seconds to stabilize. You may see this when first connecting a capacitor or when the delay time to make a measurement is varied. A high quality film capacitor typically shows the least of this and an electrolytic capacitor the most, with ceramic capacitors typically in between.

# Digitizing Measurements

The digitize mode applies only to the 34465A/70A with the DIG option, and as is available only from the DMM's front panel. The digitized mode provides a front–panel user interface that allows you to quickly set up digitized measurements.

Digitizing is the process of converting a continuous analog signal, such as a sine wave, into a series of discrete samples (readings). The figure below shows the result of digitizing a sine wave. This chapter discusses the various ways to digitize signals. The importance of the sampling rate, and how to use level triggering.




# The Sampling Rate

The Nyquist or Sampling Theorem states: If a continuous, bandwidth-limited signal contains no frequency components higher than F, then the original signal can be recovered without distortion (aliasing) if it is sampled at a rate that is greater than 2F samples per second.

In practice, the multimeter's sampling rate must be greater than twice the highest frequency component of the signal being measured. From the front panel you can select a sample rate in samples per second using the **Sample Rate** softkey. You can also set the sample rate indirectly by specifying the sample interval (the time from the beginning of one sample to the beginning of the next sample) using the **Sample Interval** softkey.

The figure below shows a sine wave sampled at a rate slightly less than 2F. As shown by the dashed line, the result is an alias frequency which is much different than the frequency of the signal being measured. Some digitizers have a built-in anti-aliasing low-pass filter with a sharp cutoff at a frequency equal to 1/2 the digitizer's sampling rate. This limits the bandwidth of the input signal so that aliasing cannot occur. Since the multimeter has a variable sample rate for DCV digitizing, and to preserve the upper bandwidth

for high-frequency measurements, no anti-aliasing filter is provided in the multimeter. If you are concerned about aliasing, you should add an external anti-aliasing filter.




# Level Triggering

When digitizing, it is important to begin sampling at some defined point on the input signal such as when the signal crosses zero volts or when it reaches the midpoint of its positive or negative peak amplitude. Level triggering allows you to specify when (with respect to voltage and slope) to begin sampling. Refer to Level Triggering for more information.

## About Digitize Mode

- Digitizing is available only for the 34465A/70A and requires the DIG option.
- Digitizing allows you to take samples of the input signal, at a specified Sample Rate (for example, 50 kHz) or Sample Interval (for example, 20 μS). You can specify the Duration as either an amount of Time or a number of Readings (samples). You can use either auto, external, or level triggering. After pressing [Acquire], press Acquire > Digitize. You can then select the digitizing/triggering parameters. After configuring the digitizing parameters, press [Run/Stop]. Digitizing will begin when the specified trigger event occurs.
- Digitize mode is available only from the front panel and can only be used for DCV or DCI measurement functions.
- When you specify digitizing settings that conflict with present settings, the instrument displays a message, and in most cases, adjusts settings to legal values. For example, if you configure digitizing for a greater sample rate than can be achieved with the present integration time (NPLC setting), the instrument displays a message and reduces the integration time. When you see a displayed message, such as NPLC setting reduced to achieve digitize rate/interval, you can press Shift > Help > 1 View the last message displayed > Select to view more information.
- The DIG option increases the maximum reading rates from 5k readings/s (standard) to 50k readings/s (maximum).
- The DIG option enables pretriggering, level triggering, and trigger delay capability.

- With the DIG option, level triggering, pretriggering, and sample timer capabilities are enabled when using
  the DMM from remote. From the front panel, level trigger is available for digitizing and for certain measurement functions in continuous mode (see Level Triggering for more information). Pretrigger front panel
  controls are only available in the digitize mode. The sample timer controls are available from the front
  panel for all measurement modes.
- For pretrigger, if a trigger comes before all pretriggers are received, trigger is executed to begin readings.
- While digitizing, Digitizing flashes near the top of the display. When stopped, Digitize Stopped is displayed. While digitizing, the remaining time and remaining samples are displayed near the bottom of the display.



- All samples taken during digitizing are saved in volatile memory. After completing a digitize operation, press the **Save Readings** softkey and specify a file to save the digitized readings to a file.
- The maximum number of readings that can be captured is based on volatile memory space available.
- Reading store is cleared at the start of a new acquisition.
- The slowest sample rate for digitizing is 20 ms (1 PLC); the fastest is 19.953 μs/50.118 kHz (.001 PLC).
- Any display mode can be set to view data during acquisition but responsiveness to data views may not respond until data acquisition is complete. After acquisition is complete trend chart pan, zoom, and cursors can be used to review data.
- Statistics and histogram data are calculated after the digitizing is completed.

## Data Log and Digitizing Local Remote Interaction

### CAUTION

Loss of data possible - local to remote transition clears instrument memory: When data logging or digitizing to memory, if you access the instrument from remote (send a SCPI or common command)\* and then return to local (by pressing [Local]), the readings in memory are cleared and the instrument returns to Continuous mode.

For data logging only, you can prevent this situation by data logging to a file instead of to memory (see Data Log Mode for details). You can also prevent this from happening for data logging or digitizing by taking steps to keep the instrument from being accessed from remote. To prevent remote access, you may want to disconnect the LAN, GPIB, and USB interface cables from the instrument before starting the measurements. To prevent remote access via LAN, you can connect the instrument behind a router to minimize the possibility of remote access. You can also disable the various I/O interfaces from the front panel menus under [Utility] > I/O Config.

To view the status of a data logging or digitizing operation remotely, use the instrument's Web User Interface. The Web User Interface monitor does not set the instrument to remote.

# Data Log Mode

The Data Log mode is standard on the 34465A and 34470A only, as is available only from the DMM's front panel. Data Log mode provides a front–panel user interface that allows you to set up data logging into the instrument's non–volatile memory, or to internal/external file(s), without programming, and without a connection to a computer. Once you have finished collecting data, you can view it from the front panel, or you can transfer the data to your computer. Data Log mode allows you to log a specified number of readings, or readings acquired for a specified period of time, to instrument memory or to internal or external data files.

To select Data Log mode, press [Acquire] Acquire > Data Log. You can then select the Sample Interval (time between measurements - for example, 500 ms), Duration as either an amount of Time or a number of Readings, whether to Start after a Delay or at a specific Time of Day, and whether to Log to Memory or Log to File(s). After configuring the data logging parameters, press [Run/Stop]. Data logging will begin following the specified Delay or at the specified Time of Day.

#### CAUTION

Loss of data possible - local to remote transition clears instrument memory: When data logging or digitizing *to memory*, if you access the instrument from remote (send a SCPI or common command)\* and then return to local (by pressing [Local]), the readings in memory are cleared and the instrument returns to Continuous mode.



## Data Log Mode Features

- The Data Log mode is available for DC voltage, DC current, AC voltage, AC current, 2-wire and 4-wire
  resistance, frequency, period, temperature, capacitance, and ratio measurements. The Data Log mode
  is not available for the continuity or diode functions.
- The maximum data log rate is 1000 readings/sec. Note: The maximum reading rate may be limited by settings already configured when entering data log mode (particularly NPLC settings for DC and resistance measurements). In this situation, press the measurement function key (for example, DCV) and decrease the aperture setting (either NPLC or Time).


#### Measurement Tutorial

- Data Log mode settings and measurement settings interact. These include the sample interval, destination (memory or file), measurement function, NPLC, Aperture, Autorange, Autozero, Offset Compensation, AC Filter, TC Open Check, and Gate Time. When you specify data log settings that conflict with present settings, the instrument displays a message, and in most cases, adjusts settings to legal values. For example, if you configure data logging for more readings than can be saved to reading memory, the instrument displays a message and reduces the maximum number of readings. When you see a displayed message, such as *The data logging Sample Interval increased*, you can press Shift > Help > 1 View the last message displayed > Select to view more information.
- The maximum data logging duration is 100 hours, the minimum is 1 second.
- By default, data logging implements auto trigger. The level and external trigger sources are not supported for data logging.
- When the data log mode is running, Data Logging flashes near the top of the display, and the log file
  path (when data logging to a file) remaining time, and remaining samples is displayed near the bottom
  of the display.




- You can store data logging readings in volatile memory for display or write the readings to one or more files.
- When data logging to memory, the data is volatile (not remaining during power off) but can be saved to an internal or external file after data logging is complete. The number of readings you can store in memory depends on the MEM option. With the MEM option, the limit is 2,000,000 readings. Without the MEM option, the limit is 50,000 readings.
- When data logging to file(s):
  - You can append the data logging start date and time to the file name using the format: \_ YYYYMMDD\_HHMMSS. For example, for a file named *Data*, the result will be similar to *Data\_20140720\_032542.csv*.
  - You specify internal or external and a file name. If more than one file needs to be created to hold the data, the second filename will be appended with \_00001, the third filename with \_00002, and so on. When data logging to files, the maximum number of readings you can data log to files is 100 hours x 1000rdgs/sec = 360,000,000.

As shown in the sample data file graphic below, when Metadata is On, (see Data Logging/Options
for details), each data log file contains a Start Date and Start Time showing when the first reading
was taken, the reading numbers, the sample interval, and the reading data. You can specify a
comma, tab, or semicolon delimiter to separate the values.



When Metadata is off, only the reading data is saved:



# Data Logging and the Trend Chart Display

- When data logging to memory, the trend chart maps each reading to a dot in a pixel column, draws a line between multiple dots in each column, and draws a line from the last reading in a column to the first reading in the next column.
- When data logging to a file, if the instrument determines the readings will fit in memory, the trend
  chart behaves as it does when data logging to memory. If there are too many readings to save in
  memory, the trend chart behaves in a manner similar to that of the continuous measurement mode.
  That is, the number of readings shown per pixel column depends on the reading rate and the selected
  Time Window.



# Level Triggering

Level triggering is available only on the 34465A/70A with the DIG option. Level triggering allows you to trigger measurements at some defined point on the input signal, such as when the signal crosses zero volts or when it reaches the midpoint of its positive or negative peak amplitude. For example, this graphic shows sampling beginning as the input signal crosses OV with a positive slope:



# About Level Trigger

Level triggering is available for these measurement functions:

- DC voltage and DC current
- AC voltage and AC current
- 2-wire and 4-wire resistance with offset compensation off, and low power off
- Temperature, RTD or thermistor sensors only
- Frequency and period

The level trigger is edge-sensitive. That is, the instrument must detect a *change* in the quantity being measured from one side of the level setting to the other side (direction controlled by Slope setting). For example, if the Slope is positive, then the quantity being measured must first reach a value *below* the set level before a trigger event can be detected.

Level trigger performance is not uniform. Its accuracy, latency, and sensitivity are dependent on other DMM features. These dependencies vary by measurement function as described below.

#### DC voltage, DC current, and 2-wire resistance considerations

These measurement functions can use a fast-response detector built into the hardware for fixed-range measurements. For lowest latency and highest sensitivity, use a fixed range when using level trigger. However, trigger level accuracy is reduced when the hardware detector is used.

To increase trigger level accuracy and reduce sensitivity (avoid false triggers due to noise), use autorange:

#### Measurement Tutorial

- When auto-range is enabled, trigger level accuracy is increased, latency is increased, and sensitivity is decreased as the aperture or NPLC setting is increased.
- When auto-range is enabled, trigger level accuracy is increased, latency is increased, and sensitivity is decreased if autozero is enabled.
- When auto-range is enabled, range changes may be made while waiting for the trigger crossing which can cause additional latency/uncertainty.

### 4-wire resistance and temperature considerations

- Trigger level accuracy is increased, latency is increased, and sensitivity is decreased as aperture or NPLC is increased.
- Fixed range (only available for resistance) eliminates uncertainties (due to range change) in trigger latency.

### AC voltage and AC current considerations

- Trigger latency is increased, and sensitivity is decreased as filter bandwidth is increased.
- Trigger latency can be controlled by trigger delay setting.
- Fixed range eliminates uncertainties (due to range change) in trigger latency.
- Autorange uncertainties become worse as filter bandwidth is increased.

### Frequency and period considerations

- Trigger level accuracy is increased, latency is increased, and sensitivity is decreased as gate time is increased.
- Fixed voltage range eliminates uncertainties (due to range change) in trigger latency.

## Other Sources of Measurement Error

# Settling Time Effects

The multimeter can insert automatic measurement settling delays. These delays are adequate for resistance measurements with less than 200 pF of combined cable and device capacitance. This is particularly important when measuring resistances above 100 k $\Omega$ . Settling due to RC time constant effects can be quite long. Some precision resistors and multi–function calibrators use large parallel capacitors (1000 pF to 0.1  $\mu$ F) with high resistor values to filter out noise currents injected by their internal circuitry. Non–ideal capacitances in cables and other devices may have much longer settling times than expected just by RC time constants due to dielectric absorption (soak) effects. Errors are measured when settling after the initial connection and after a range change.

## Loading Errors (AC volts)

In the AC voltage function, the input of the multimeter appears as a 1 M $\Omega$  resistance in parallel with 100 pF of capacitance. The cabling that you use to connect signals to the multimeter also adds capacitance and loading. The table below shows the multimeter's approximate input resistance at various frequencies.

Input Frequency	Input Resistance (kΩ)
100 Hz	941
1 kHz	614
10 kHz	137
100 kHz	15.7

For low frequencies, the loading error is:

$$Error (\%) = \frac{-100 \text{ x } R_s}{R_s + 1 \text{ M}\Omega}$$

At high frequencies, the additional loading error is:

Error (%) = 100 x 
$$\left[ \frac{1}{\sqrt{1 + (2 \pi x F x R_s x C_{in})^2}} - 1 \right]$$

R<sub>s</sub> = source resistance

F = input frequency

C<sub>in</sub> = input capacitance (100 pF) plus cable capacitance

#### Measurements Below Full Scale

You can make the most accurate AC measurements when the multimeter is at or near the full scale of the selected range. Autoranging occurs at 10% (down-range) and 120% (up-range) of full scale. This enables you to measure some inputs at full scale on one range and 10% of full scale on the next higher range. In general, the accuracy is better on the lower range; for the highest accuracy, select the lowest manual range possible for the measurement.

# High-Voltage Self-Heating Errors

If you apply more than 300 Vrms, self–heating occurs in the multimeter's internal signal–conditioning components. These errors are included in the multimeter's specifications. Temperature changes inside the multimeter due to self–heating may cause additional error on other AC voltage ranges. The additional error is less than 0.02% and dissipates in a few minutes.

# AC Current Measurement Errors (Burden Voltage)

Burden voltage errors, which apply to DC current, also apply to AC current measurements. However, the burden voltage for AC current is larger due to the multimeter's series inductance and your measurement connections. The burden voltage increases as the input frequency increases. Some circuits may oscillate when performing current measurements due to the multimeter's series inductance and your measurement connections.

#### Low-Level Measurement Errors

AC voltage measurements less than 100 mV are especially susceptible to errors introduced by extraneous noise sources. An exposed test lead acts as an antenna and a properly functioning DMM will measure the signals received. The entire measurement path, including the power line, act as a loop antenna. Circulating currents in the loop create error voltages across any impedances in series with the DMM's input. Therefore, you should apply low–level AC voltages to the DMM through shielded cables, with the shield connected to the input LO terminal.

Connect the DMM and the AC source to the same electrical outlet whenever possible. You should also minimize the area of any ground loops that cannot be avoided. A high-impedance source is more susceptible to noise pickup than a low-impedance source. You can reduce the high-frequency impedance of a source by placing a capacitor in parallel with the DMM's input terminals. You may have to experiment to determine the correct capacitor for your application.

Most extraneous noise is not correlated with the input signal. You can determine the error as shown below.

$$Voltage\ Measured = \sqrt{V_{in}^{2} + Noise^{2}}$$

Correlated noise, while rare, is especially detrimental because it always adds directly to the input signal. Measuring a low–level signal with the same frequency as the local power line is a common situation that is prone to this error.


#### Common Mode Errors

Errors are generated when the multimeter's input LO terminal is driven with an AC voltage relative to earth. The most common situation where unnecessary common mode voltages are created is when the output of an AC calibrator is connected to the multimeter "backwards." Ideally, a multimeter reads the same regardless of how the source is connected. Both source and multimeter effects can degrade this ideal situation. Because of the capacitance between the input LO terminal and earth (approximately 200 pF), the source will experience different loading depending on how the input is applied. The magnitude of the error is dependent upon the source's response to this loading.

The DMM's measurement circuitry, while extensively shielded, responds differently in the backward input case due to slight differences in stray capacitance to earth. The DMM's errors are greatest for high–voltage, high–frequency inputs. Typically, the DMM exhibits about 0.06% additional error for a 100 V, 100 kHz reverse input. You can use the grounding techniques described for DC common mode problems to minimize AC common mode voltages.

## Leakage Current Errors

The DMM's input capacitance will "charge up" due to input bias currents when the terminals are open-circuited (if the input resistance is >10 G $\Omega$ ). The DMM's measuring circuitry exhibits approximately 30pA of input bias current for ambient temperatures from 0 to 30 °C. Bias current doubles for every 8 °C change in ambient temperature above 30 °C. This current generates small voltage offsets dependent upon the source resistance of the DUT. This effect becomes evident for a source resistance of greater than 100 k $\Omega$ , or when the DMM's operating temperature is significantly greater than 30 °C.



# Unnecessary Signal Errors

Both 3A and 10A terminals are available for AC and DC current measurements. If signals are applied to terminals not being used for the current measurement, measurement errors may occur. The unused terminals are protected but the additional signals may interfere with current measurements. For example, applying inputs to the 3A terminals while making measurements on the 10A terminals will typically cause errors.

Unnecessary signals applied to the Hi and Lo Sense terminals can also cause errors. AC or DC voltages above 15 volts peak on the sense terminals are likely to cause measurement errors.

# How Sample Rate/Interval is Determined

The DMM always attempts to make the sample interval greater than the expected time required to take the measurements, whether in continuous, data log, or digitize mode. A number of settings go into the calculation of the minimum allowable sample interval. These settings include the measurement function, NPLC, aperture, autorange, autozero, offset compensation, AC filter, TC open check and gate time. For example, when autorange is on, the assumption is that no more than one range change will be required. If more than one level of change occurs, the measurement may be delayed and an error will be issued.

When you change any of these settings, the sample interval (sample timer in continuous mode, sample interval in data log or digitize mode) is increased to be greater than the calculated measurement time. In the continuous and data log modes, attempting to reduce the sample interval below the calculated value results in an error message. You must then choose among the various ways you can achieve a smaller measurement time to achieve the smaller sample interval, such as decreasing the NPLC setting. For digitizing, the emphasis is on high sample rates and all settings except aperture/NPLC are fixed to achieve minimum measurement time. NPLC and aperture are automatically set to their minimum values upon entering digitize mode. If you set NPLC or aperture to greater values, the sample interval will be increased (or the sample rate decreased) to accommodate the longer measurement. However, in digitize mode, unlike continuous and data log modes, if you subsequently decrease the sample interval (or increase the sample rate), the NPLC or aperture will be reduced as needed.

Another way to put it is that for continuous and data log modes, sample timer/interval is always controlled by the other measurement settings. In digitize mode, the sample timer/interval, NPLC, and aperture have equal control; changing any one setting can change the other settings.

# Introduction to the SCPI Language

SCPI (Standard Commands for Programmable Instruments) is an ASCII-based programming language for test and measurement instruments. SCPI commands use a hierarchical structure known as a tree system. Associated commands are grouped under a common node or root, thus forming subsystems. A portion of the SENSe subsystem illustrates this, below.

#### SENSe:

VOLTage:

DC:RANGe {<range>|MIN|MAX|DEF}

DC:RANGe? [MINimum|MAXimum|DEFault]

**SENSe** is the root keyword of the command, **VOLTage** is a second-level keyword, and **DC** is a third-level keyword. A colon (:) separates consecutive keywords.

Syntax Conventions

The command syntax format is illustrated below:

VOLTage:DC:RANGe {< range > |MIN|MAX|DEF}

Most commands (and some parameters) are a mixture of upper- and lower-case letters. The upper-case letters indicate the command's abbreviated spelling, which yields shorter program lines. For better program readability, use the long form.

For example, consider the keyword VOLTage, above. You can type VOLT or VOLTage in any combination of upper- or lower-case letters. Therefore, VolTaGe, volt and Volt are all acceptable. Other forms, such as VOL and VOLTAG, generate errors.

Braces ({ } ) enclose the parameter choices. The braces are not sent with the command string.

A vertical bar (|) separates parameter choices. For example, {< range > |MIN|MAX|DEF} in the above command indicates that you can specify a numeric range parameter, or "MIN", "MAX" or "DEF". The bar is not sent with the command string.

Angle brackets ( < > ) indicate that you must specify a value for the enclosed parameter. For example, the above syntax statement shows the <range> parameter in angle brackets. Do not send the brackets with the command string. You must specify a value for the parameter (for example "VOLT:DC:RANG 10") unless you select one of the other options shown in the syntax (for example "VOLT:DC:RANG MIN").

Optional parameters are enclosed in square brackets ([]). The brackets are not sent with the command string. If you do not specify a value for an optional parameter, the instrument uses a default value.

### Command Separators

A colon (:) separates consecutive keywords. You must insert a blank space to separate a parameter from a command keyword. If a command requires more than one parameter, separate adjacent parameters using a comma:

```
CONF: VOLT: DC 10,0.003
```

A semicolon (;) separates commands within the same subsystem and can also minimize typing. For example, the following string:

```
TRIG:SOUR EXT; COUNT 10
```

is equivalent to the following two commands:

```
TRIG:SOUR EXT
TRIG:COUNT 10
```

Use a colon and a semicolon to link commands from different subsystems. For example, in the following example, an error is generated if you do not use both the colon and semicolon:

```
TRIG:COUN MIN;:SAMP:COUN MIN
```

Using the MIN, MAX and DEF Parameters

For many commands, you can substitute "MIN" or "MAX" in place of a parameter. In some cases you may also substitute "DEF". For example, consider The following example:

VOLTage:DC:RANGe {< range > |MIN|MAX|DEF}

Instead of selecting a specific value for the < range > parameter, you can substitute MIN to set the range to its minimum value, MAX to set the range to its maximum value or DEF to set the range to its default value.

Querying Parameter Settings

You can query the current value of most parameters by adding a question mark (?) to the command. For example, The following example sets the trigger count to 10 measurements:

```
TRIG:COUN 10
```

You can then query the count value by sending:

```
TRIG:COUN?
```

You can also query the minimum or maximum count allowed as follows:

```
TRIG:COUN? MIN
TRIG:COUN? MAX
```

#### SCPI Command Terminators

A command string sent to the instrument must terminate with a <new line> (<NL>) character (ASCII decimal 10). The IEEE-488 EOI (End-Or-Identify) message is interpreted as a <NL> character and can be used to terminate a command string in place of a <NL> character. A <carriage return> followed by a <NL> is also accepted. Command string termination always resets the current SCPI command path to the root level.

NOTE

For every SCPI message that includes a query and is sent to the instrument, the instrument terminates the returned response with a <NL> or line-feed character (EOI). For example, if R? is sent, the response is terminated with a <NL> after the block of data that is returned. If a SCPI message includes multiple queries separated by semicolons (for example "ROUTe:TERMinals?;R?"), the returned response is again terminated by a <NL> after the response to the last query. In either case, the program must read this <NL> in the response before another command is sent to the instrument or an error occurs.

#### IEEE-488.2 Common Commands

The IEEE-488.2 standard defines a set of common commands that perform functions such as reset, self-test and status operations. Common commands always begin with an asterisk (\*), are three characters in length and may include one or more parameters. The command keyword is separated from the first parameter by a blank space. Use a semicolon (;) to separate multiple commands as shown below:

\*RST; \*CLS; \*ESE 32; \*OPC?

#### **SCPI Parameter Types**

The SCPI language defines several data formats to be used in program messages and response messages.

#### **Numeric Parameters**

Commands that require numeric parameters accept all commonly used decimal representations of numbers including optional signs, decimal points, and scientific notation. Special values for numeric parameters such as MIN, MAX and DEF are also accepted. You can also send engineering unit suffixes with numeric parameters (e.g., M, k, m or u). If a command accepts only certain specific values, the instrument rounds the input numeric parameters to the accepted values. The following command requires a numeric parameter for the range value:

VOLTage:DC:RANGe {< range > |MIN|MAX|DEF}

NOTE

Because the SCPI parser is case-insensitive, there is some confusion over the letter "M" (or "m"). For your convenience, the instrument interprets "mV" (or "MV") as millivolts, but "MHZ" (or "mhz") as megahertz. Likewise "M $\Omega$ " (or "m $\Omega$ ") is interpreted as meg $\Omega$ . You can use the prefix "MA" for mega. For example, "MAV" is interpreted as megavolts.

#### **Discrete Parameters**

Discrete parameters are used to program settings that have a limited number of values (like IMMediate, EXTernal or BUS). They have a short form and a long form just like command keywords. You can mix upper- and lower-case letters. Query responses always return the short form in all upper-case letters. The following example requires a discrete parameters for the temperature units:

UNIT:TEMPerature {C|F|K}

#### **Boolean Parameters**

Boolean parameters represent a single binary condition that is either true or false. For a false condition, the instrument accepts "OFF" or "0". For a true condition, the instrument accepts "ON" or "1". When you query a Boolean setting, the instrument returns "0" or "1". The following example requires a Boolean parameter:

DISPlay:STATe {ON|1|OFF|0}

### **ASCII String Parameters**

String parameters can contain virtually any set of ASCII characters. A string must begin and end with matching quotes; either with a single quote or a double quote. You can include the quote delimiter as part of the string by typing it twice without any characters in between. The following command uses a string parameter:

DISPlay:TEXT < quoted string>

For example, The following example displays the message "WAITING..." on the instrument's front panel (the quotes are not displayed).

```
DISP:TEXT "WAITING..."
```

You can also display the same message using The following example with single quotes.

```
DISP:TEXT 'WAITING...'
```

#### Using Device Clear

Device Clear is an IEEE-488 low-level bus message that you can use to return the instrument to a responsive state. Different programming languages and IEEE-488 interface cards provide access to this capability through their own unique commands. The status registers, the error queue, and all configuration states are left unchanged when a Device Clear message is received.

Device Clear performs the following actions:

- If a measurement is in progress, it is aborted.
- The instrument returns to the trigger "idle" state.
- The instrument's input and output buffers are cleared.
- The instrument is prepared to accept a new command string.
- An overlapped command, if any, is terminated with no "Operation Complete" indication (applies to INIT).

NOTE The ABORt command is the recommended method to terminate a measurement.



#### Mass Memory (MMEMory) and State Storage

Then enter the following commands. If you do not have a USB drive change "USB:\" to "INT:\" to use the instrument's internal flash drive instead.

- The front panel sample annunciator ("\*") turns on during each measurement at slower rates. The annunciator toggles at a fixed rate for fast measurements.
- You can use the specified sample count in conjunction with a trigger count (TRIGger:COUNt), which
  sets the number of triggers to be accepted before returning to the "idle" trigger state. The total number of measurements returned are the product of the sample count and trigger count.
- You can store up to 1,000 measurements in the reading memory of the 34460A, 10,000 measurements on the 34461A, 50,000 measurements on the 34465A/70A (without the MEM option), or 2,000,000 measurements on the 34465A/70A (with the MEM option). If reading memory overflows, new measurements overwrite the oldest measurements stored; the most recent measurements are always preserved. No error is generated, but the Reading Mem Ovfl bit (bit 14) is set in the Questionable Data Register's condition register (see Status System Introduction).

- MAX selects 1 billion readings. However, when pretrigger is selected, the maximum is 50,000 readings (without the MEM option) or 2,000,000 readings (with the MEM option).
- This parameter is set to its default value after a Factory Reset (\*RST) or Instrument Preset (SYSTem:PRESet).

Allows collection of the data being digitized *before* the trigger. Reserves memory for pretrigger samples up to the specified number of pretrigger samples.

For example, with a sample count of 50,000, and a pretrigger sample count of 20,000, up to 20,000 samples are taken before the trigger, then 30,000 samples are taken after the trigger occurs.

The sample count and pretrigger count do not affect when the trigger occurs. If the memory allocated for pretrigger samples fills up, the oldest readings are discarded. In the example above, the 20,000 *most recent* pretrigger samples are saved, even if more than 20,000 samples occur before the trigger. If the trigger occurs *before* the pretrigger count is satisfied, only the actual pretrigger samples taken are saved.

In all cases, after the trigger is received, only *sample count* minus *specified pretrigger count* readings are taken. In this example, if the trigger occurs after 5 pretrigger samples have been taken (instead of the specified 20,000), only 30,000 post-trigger samples are taken. This is because memory was reserved for 20,000 pretrigger samples.

• If a trigger occurs during a measurement, that measurement is considered to be a pretrigger sample.

#### SCPI Programming Reference

- After setting the sample count and pretrigger sample count, you must place the DMM in the "waitfor-trigger" state using INITiate or READ? An external trigger is buffered until the DMM is in the "waitfor-trigger" state.
- The pretrigger sample count must be less than the sample count set with the SAMPle:COUNt command, and there must be at least one post-trigger sample:

Pretrigger Sample Count ≤ Sample Count - 1

- If any of the calculation functions are on (CALC:STAT ON), the pretrigger count is limited to 10,000 samples.
- CONFigure and MEASure? set the pretrigger sample count to "0".
- The instrument sets the pretrigger sample count to "0" after a Factory Reset (\*RST command) or a Preset (SYSTem:PRESet command).



#### Operation


In all cases, the first sample is taken one trigger delay time after the trigger (the delay being set with the TRIGger:DELay command). Beyond that, the timing mechanism depends on whether you select IMMediate (default) or TIMer as the source:

• IMMediate - The first sample starts one trigger delay time after the trigger, and then the trigger delay time is inserted between the first and second samples, the second and third, and so on:



The sample timing *is not* deterministic because the delay time (set with TRIGger:DELay) is inserted *after* each sample completes. The actual time required to take each sample depends on the integration time and autoranging time. In this case, the SAMPle:TIMer command has no effect.

• TIMer - The first sample starts one trigger delay time after the trigger. However, the second sample starts one sample interval after the start of the first sample, and so on:



The sample timing *is* deterministic because the start of each sample is determined by the sample interval, set with the SAMPle:TiMer command (TRIGger:DELay affects only the start of the first sample). Integration and autoranging affect the sampling time for each sample, but not the sample interval as long as the sample interval is longer than the sampling time.

#### Remarks

- Applies only to the 34465A and 34470A.
- This command has no effect if the sample count is 1 (see SAMPle:COUNt).
- After setting the sample count, sample source, and the sample interval or trigger delay time, you must
  place the instrument in the "wait-for-trigger" state using the INITiate or READ? command. A trigger is
  not accepted from the selected trigger source (see TRIGger:SOURce command) until the instrument is
  in the "wait-for-trigger" state.
- The instrument sets the sample source to "IMM" after a Factory Reset (\*RST command) or an instrument Preset (SYSTem:PRESet command).



The first sample is taken one trigger delay time after the trigger (delay set by TRIGger:DELay). The second sample starts one sample interval after the start of the first sample, and so forth, as shown below:



Note that the sample timing is determinant because the start of each sample is determined by the sample interval. Integration and autoranging affect the sampling time for each sample, but not the sample interval as long as the sample interval is longer than the sampling time. Periodic sampling continues until the sample count (set with the SAMPle:COUNt command) is satisfied.

NOTE

It is recommended that all triggered measurements be made using an appropriate fixed manual range. That is, turn autorange off (SENSe:<function>:RANGe:AUTO OFF), or set a fixed range using the SENSe:<function>:RANGe, CONFigure, or MEASure command. When autorange is left on, the starting time of a sample becomes uncertain (when a range change occurs) and when ranging exceeds the interval between samples; then all subsequent samples become offset from their desired start points.

Set the sample interval to 0.1 seconds. INIT sets the meter to the "wait-for-trigger" state. When a trigger is received from the selected trigger source, the instrument waits the trigger delay time, and then takes readings every 0.10 seconds until the sample count is satisfied.

SAMP:SOUR TIM SAMP:TIM 0.1 INIT

• The value of MIN is measurement dependent. It depends on such things as the integration time, autozero on or off, autorange on or off, and the measurement range. Basically, MIN is automatically determined so that the sample interval is always greater than the sampling time (see above illustration). Execute SAMPle:TIMer? MIN to determine the recommended interval for the current measurement configuration.

- Since the minimum value changes depending on configuration, a command order dependency exists. You must completely configure the measurement before setting the sample timer to MIN, or you may generate an error. A complete configuration includes such things as math statistics or scaling.
- When using autorange, the MIN value is the recommended value, not the absolute minimum value. With autorange enabled, MIN is calculated assuming a single range change will occur for every measurement (not multiple ranges, just one range up or down per measurement). You can specify an <interval> between the absolute minimum (assumes no range changes) and the recommended MIN value, but it may generate a timing violation error when making measurements. Applying a value less than the absolute minimum will generate an error.
- To determine the absolute minimum value for the present configuration, set the sample time to 20 µs (which may generate a settings conflict error), then read back the current sample timer value using the SAMPle:TIMer? query. The sample source must be set to timer with a sample count or trigger count greater than 1, for the settings conflict error to occur. The settings conflict error causes the timer to be set to the absolute minimum value.
- The sample time resolution is 1 µs, the aperture resolution is 2 us, and the actual hardware resolution is not exactly 1 µs. There are cases where a sample time value, rounded to the nearest hardware resolution, will result in a smaller value than aperture when rounded to 2 µs. This will create error 221, "Settings conflict; cannot meet requested timing; SAMP:TIM changed". For example, the following sequence of commands generates error -221 and sets the sample time to +2.00100000E-003.

This error can also occur if you attempt to set both values an odd number of  $\mu$ s. For example, setting both values to 23  $\mu$ s, generates error -221 and sets the sample timer to 24  $\mu$ s.

- After setting the sample count, source, and delay time, you must place the meter in the "wait-for-trigger" state using the INITiate or READ? command. A trigger is not accepted from the selected trigger source (see TRIGger:SOURce command) until the instrument is in the "wait-for-trigger" state.
- The interval may be set to any value from the absolute minimum described above to 3600 seconds. However, the value is rounded to the nearest step. For dc measurements, the step size is 1 μs. For ac measurements, it is ac bandwidth dependent.
- The instrument sets the sample timer to 1 second after a reset (\*RST command) or an instrument preset (SYSTem:PRESet command).



# Range, Resolution and Integration Time (shown in Aperture and NPLCs)

The following three tables show the integration time (in PLC and seconds) for each range and resolution.

To determine the PLC for a specified range and resolution:

- 1. Locate the range in the left column. Measurement units do not apply (i.e. for 1 V or 1 A, use the 1 range; for 100 V or 100  $\Omega$ , use the 100 range).
- 2. From the range value, follow the corresponding row of resolutions to the right until the specified resolution lies within two adjacent columns for your DMM model.
- 3. The NPLC value at the top of the left-adjacent column is the NPLC "setting" for the given range and resolution.

For example: for the 34461A, a specified 10 VDC range and 10  $\mu$ V resolution, locate range 10 in the table. Moving to the right, the 10  $\mu$ V resolution (1E-5) is found in the column under 10 NPLC.



The instrument returns error messages in accordance with the SCPI standard.

- Up to 20 errors can be stored in the instrument's error queue. Each remote interface I/O session (GPIB, USB, VXI-11, Telnet/Sockets) has its own interface-specific error queue. Errors appear in the error queue of the I/O session that caused the error. For example, if an error was generated by a command sent over GPIB, send SYSTem:ERRor? from GPIB to read the error queue. Errors generated by instrument hardware are broadcast to all I/O sessions.
- The instrument beeps each time an error is generated (unless disabled by SYSTem:BEEPer:STATe OFF).

  The front panel **Error** annunciator turns on when one or more errors are in the error queue.
- A special global error queue holds all power-on and hardware-related errors (for example, over-temperature).
- Error retrieval is first-in-first-out (FIFO), and errors are cleared as you read them. When you have read all of the interface-specific errors, the errors in the global error queue are retrieved. When you have read all errors from the interface-specific and global error queues, the **Error** annunciator turns off.
- If more than 20 errors have occurred, the most recent error stored in the queue is replaced with 350,"Queue overflow". No additional errors are stored until you remove errors from the queue. If no errors have occurred when you read the error queue, the instrument responds with +0,"No error".
- The front panel reports errors from all I/O sessions and the global error queue. To read the error queue from the front panel, press Help > View remote command error queue.
- Error conditions are also summarized in the Status Byte Register. For more information on the SCPI Status System, see Status Subsystem Introduction.
- The interface-specific error queues are cleared by the \*CLS (Clear Status) command and when power is cycled. All errors are cleared when you read the error queue. The error queue is not cleared by a Factory Reset (\*RST) or an Instrument Preset (SYSTem:PRESet).

#### • Front Panel:

If the **Error** annunciator is on, there are errors in the error queue. The **Remote** annunciator is likely on as well. Press the **Local** key to return to local operation (the **Remote** annunciator goes off). Then press **[Help]**, select "View remote command error queue" in the menu and press **Select**. Use the menu navigation "arrow" keys to view the error messages. Press **Back** to exit and clear the error queue.

### Types of Service Available

If your instrument fails during the warranty period, Keysight Technologies will repair or replace it under the terms of your warranty. After your warranty expires, Keysight offers repair services at competitive prices. You also have the option to purchase a service contract that extends coverage after the standard warranty expires.

#### Obtaining Repair Service (Worldwide)

To obtain service for your instrument, contact your nearest Keysight Technologies Service Center. They will arrange to have your unit repaired or replaced, and can provide warranty or repair—cost information where applicable. Ask the Keysight Technologies Service Center for shipping instructions, including what components to ship. Keysight recommends that you retain the original shipping carton for return shipments.

#### Repackaging for Shipment

To ship the unit to Keysight for service or repair:

- Attach a tag to the unit identifying the owner and indicating the required service or repair. Include the model number and full serial number.
- Place the unit in its original container with appropriate packaging material.
- Secure the container with strong tape or metal bands.



# Troubleshooting

Before troubleshooting or repairing the instrument, make sure the failure is in the instrument rather than any external connections. Also make sure that the instrument was accurately calibrated within the last year (see Calibration Interval). The instrument's circuits allow troubleshooting and repair with basic test equipment.

CAUTION

DO NOT swap the motherboard or the front panel board from one instrument to another. These boards contain model number and serial number information that uniquely identifies a specific unit, and boards that are mismatched to the instrument may result in problems with its performance, licensing, serviceability, importability/exportability or warranty.

#### **Troubleshooting Procedure**

- 1. Remove all remote I/O connections and front panel connections to the instrument. Verify that:
  - a. the AC mains power cord is securely connected to the instrument and plugged into a live outlet
  - b. the front panel Power On/Standby switch has been pushed
- 2. If the standby light below the power switch is not illuminated, re-verify the items above. If all this is correct, check the AC mains power and then the internal line fuse.
- 3. If the standby light is on (yellow or green), press the power button. If there is no response, replace the front panel board because the power button on the front panel board is likely broken.
- 4. Check the voltages on the power supply. If one or more of these tests fail, disconnect the transformer secondaries from the main board and measure the voltages from the transformer with an AC voltmeter.

The voltage between the red and orange wires (below)should measure 7.5 to 11 VAC.



The voltage between the brown and white wires (below) should measure 11 to 15 VAC.



5. If the voltages are correct, replace the main board; otherwise replace the transformer.

6. Turn the instrument on. If the power-on sequence completes and the display appears to function properly, verify that the instrument is in local mode (the Remote annunciator in the upper right corner of the display is not on), and run the full self-test ([Utility] > Test/Admin > Self-Test > Full Test). If the display is illegible, replace the front panel board.

CAUTION

Ensure that all connections (front and rear) are removed when self-test is performed. During self-test, errors may be induced by signals present on external wiring, such as long test leads that can act as antennas.

- 7. If the self test generates an error, record the error code and message and contact Keysight support if necessary.
- 8. If the self test does not generate an error:
  - a. If remote I/O on GPIB (optional) is not working, replace the GPIB board.
  - b. If the measurements are out of specification, you may wish to calibrate the instrument before deciding to replace the main board.
  - c. If the front panel buttons are not working, make sure the unit is in local mode (the Remote annunciator in the upper right corner of the display is not displayed). If that does not solve the problem, replace the front panel board.
  - d. If the display is dim, adjust the display intensity.
- If the instrument does not complete the power-on sequence, check the signal frequency at test point TP200 on the front panel board and verify that it is 29.8 kHz ± 500 Hz. If the frequency is not correct, replace the front panel board.



10. Also verify that the voltage is  $3.3 \text{ V} \pm 5\%$  at resistor R121, referenced to the instrument chassis. If this voltage is incorrect, replace the front panel board.



#### Self-Test Procedures

#### Power-On Self-Test

Each time the instrument is powered on, it performs a self-test on its real-time clock, keyboard processor, power controller, measurement processor, calibration memory, FPGA, ADC, gain and offset circuitry, and voltage references. This self-test is equivalent to the \*TST? SCPI query, and you do not need to remove inputs to the instrument to run the test.

#### Full Self-Test

A complete self-test (TEST:ALL?) takes approximately two seconds. This tests all of the items tested by the power-on self-test and includes further tests for gain, current source, and shunt circuitry.

When self-test completes, either "Self-test Passed" or "Self-test Failed" appears on front panel.

Execute the complete self-test before performing any verification or calibration procedures.

You must remove all input connections to the instrument before running the full self-test.

#### Remote I/O Execution

- Connect to the instrument using the remote interface (Remote Interface Configuration).
- 2. Send \*TST? or TEST:ALL? and read the result: pass (+0) or fail (+1). Use SYSTem:ERRor? to view errors. See the list of self-test errors for details.

#### Front Panel Execution

- 1. Press [Shift] > [Utility] > Test/Admin > Self Test.
- 2. View any failures by pressing [Shift] > [Help] > View remote command error queue.

## Disassembly

This section describes the procedure for disassembling the instrument.

WARNING

Only qualified, service-trained personnel who are aware of the hazards involved should remove instrument covers. Always disconnect the power cable and any external circuits before removing the instrument cover. Some circuits are active and have power applied even when the power switch is turned off.

Always disconnect all inputs, cords, and cables before disassembling the instrument.

CAUTION

Do not turn the screw that fastens the shield in place, as this will affect the instrument's calibration.



### **Tools Required**

The following tools are required.

- T20 Torx driver (most disassembly)
- Small, flat-blade screw driver (for prying)

#### General Disassembly Procedure

- 1. Turn off the power and remove all measurement leads and other cables, including the power cord, from the instrument before continuing.
- 2. Rotate the handle to the upright position and remove it by pulling outward where it attaches to the case.



- 3. Pull off the front rubber bumper.
- 4. Unscrew the two captive screws in the rear bezel and remove the rear bezel and rubber bumper.



5. Remove the screw on the bottom of the instrument and place it in a safe location for re-assembly. Slide off the instrument cover.



At this point, the instrument it sufficiently disassembled for power supply troubleshooting purposes. You could also change the battery or override calibration security at this point. If you need to disassemble the front panel, continue with the steps shown below.

6. Use the small, flat-blade screwdriver to pry the black latch up and remove it. Note the orientation of the latch for re-assembly purposes.



7. Push in on the lever shown, and squeeze the metal frame of the instrument to release the front panel plastic.



- 8. Slide the front panel off.
- 9. Slide the white plastic backing plate to the right and lift up on the left side of the backing plate to remove it.



10. Remove the front panel PCBA by holding the connector housing shown below and lifting it out.



11. Remove the ESD shield by prying it out gently from the plastic housing to which it attaches.



This concludes the disassembly procedure. To re-assemble the instrument, reverse the procedure.

### **Battery Replacement**

This section describes the procedure for replacing the battery on the instrument's front panel.

WARNING

Only qualified, service-trained personnel who are aware of the hazards involved should remove instrument covers. Always disconnect the power cable and any external circuits before removing the instrument cover. Some circuits are active and have power applied even when the power switch is turned off.

Always disconnect all inputs, cords, and cables before disassembling the instrument.



#### Procedure

- 1. Turn off the power and remove all measurement leads and other cables, including the power cord, from the instrument before continuing.
- 2. Follow the disassembly procedure to disassemble the instrument.
- 3. Locate the battery on the front panel, and position the screwdriver tip under the battery, as shown.



4. Use the screwdriver to pry the battery from the battery holder.



- 5. Remove the battery and discard or recycle it in accordance with all applicable regulations.
- 6. Position the new battery in the battery holder, + side up. Push down gently to seat the battery in the holder.



7. Re-assemble the instrument completely before connecting any cables or cords.

This concludes the battery replacement procedure.

## 3 A and 10 A Current Path Fuse Replacement

This section describes the procedure for testing and replacing the 3 A and 10 A current path fuses inside the instrument.

WARNING

Only qualified, service-trained personnel who are aware of the hazards involved should remove instrument covers. Always disconnect the power cable and any external circuits before removing the instrument cover. Some circuits are active and have power applied even when the power switch is turned off.

Always disconnect all inputs, cords, and cables before disassembling the instrument.

CAUTION

Do not turn the screw that fastens the shield in place, as this will affect the instrument's calibration.



#### **Tools Required**

- T20 Torx driver (most disassembly)
- Small, flat-blade screw driver (for prying)

#### Testing the Fuses

#### 3 A Current Path

To determine whether the instrument's 3 A current path has a fuse that must be replaced, press [Cont] to put the DMM in continuity measurement mode, and short the HI Input terminal to the 3 A current terminal. If the measurement displays OPEN, one of the two fuses must be replaced. One fuse is accessible from the instrument's rear panel; the other is internal.

If the 3 A current path has a bad fuse, it is very likely to be the fuse accessible from the lower left corner of the instrument's rear panel (part number 2110-1547, 3.15 A, 500 VAC/400 VDC, time delay). Simply use a flat-blade screw driver to turn the fuse holder counter-clockwise and access the fuse. Put the new fuse into the fuse holder and insert the assembly back into the instrument, turning the fuse holder clockwise to lock it in place.

If the 3 A path still has a bad fuse, replace the internal 3 A current path fuse as described below.


#### 10 A Current Path (34461A/65A/70A only)

To determine whether the instrument's 10 A current path has a fuse that must be replaced, press [Cont] to put the DMM in continuity measurement mode, and short the HI Input terminal to the 10 A current terminal. If the measurement displays OPEN, replace the internal 10 A current path fuse as described below.

#### Internal Fuse Replacement Procedure

Both internal current path fuses are part number 2110-1402, 11 A, 1000 V, fast acting. To replace an internal fuse:

- 1. Turn off the power and remove all measurement leads and other cables, including the power cord, from the instrument before continuing.
- 2. Follow the disassembly procedure to disassemble the instrument.
- 3. Locate the fuse to be replaced, as shown below.



- 4. Use the screwdriver to pry the fuse from the fuse holder, being careful not to damage the circuit board. For the 3 A fuse, it may be easiest to access the fuse from the side, through the rectangular aperture in the sheet metal.
- 5. Remove the fuse.
- 6. Position the new fuse in the fuse holder. Push down gently to seat the fuse in the holder.
- 7. Re-assemble the instrument completely before connecting any cables or cords.

This concludes the fuse replacement procedure.

## Installing the Optional GPIB Interface

WARNING

This procedure should be performed by qualified service personnel only. Turn off the power and remove all measurement leads and other cables, including the power cord, from the instrument before continuing.

  - d. Verify the new code and press **Yes** to confirm the change.

This provides a simple method to achieve high confidence in the instrument's ability to functionally operate and meet specifications. These tests represent the absolute minimum set of performance checks recommended following any service activity. Auditing the instrument's performance for the quick check points (designated by a Q) verifies performance for "normal" accuracy drift mechanisms. This test does not check for abnormal component failures.

To perform the quick performance check, do the following:

- Perform a self-test.
- Perform only the performance verification tests indicated with the letter Q.

If the instrument fails the quick performance check, calibration or repair is required.

The Quick Performance Check can be limited by the factors described in the following section (*Performance Verification Tests*).

#### Performance Verification Tests

The performance verification tests are recommended as acceptance tests when you first receive the instrument. The acceptance test results should be compared against the 90 day test limits. You should use the 24 hour test limits only for verification within 24 hours after performing the calibration adjustment procedure.

If a Fluke 5725A Calibrator is not available, current verification can be limited to 2A. This will limit the span of verification on the 10A ranges to only 2A.

If the instrument fails performance verification, calibration adjustment or repair is required.

To reset the date used to determine the specifications versus time, a calibration with adjustment is required.

The allowable errors for verification are the published specifications (see the instrument data sheet at www.keysight.com/find/truevolt-doc). The periods in the published specifications are since the last full calibration adjustment.

## Recommended Test Equipment

The recommended test equipment for the performance verification and calibration is listed below. If the exact instrument is not available, substitute calibration standards of equivalent accuracy.

An alternate method is to use the Keysight 3458A 8½-digit Digital Multimeter to measure less accurate, yet stable, sources. The output value measured from the source can be entered into the instrument as the target calibration value.

You will need a test input cable and connectors set and a low thermal input short, Keysight 34172B, to calibrate the instrument (see Input Connections). Two input shorts are recommended for the 34461A/65A/70A.

### Calibration Procedures

This section contains procedures for adjusting the instrument's performance (calibration).



There is no separate calibration for Diode or Continuity, because these functions are based on the resistance measurement, which is calibrated. Also, there is no calibration for gate time because this functionality is controlled by digital logic. There is no calibration for capacitance gain and, for the 34465A and 34470A, no calibration on the 1, 10, and 100  $\mu\text{A}$  DCI ranges

Use one of the following sets of procedures based on the DMM model number:

- 34460A and 34461A Calibration Procedures
- 34465A and 34470A Calibration Procedures

#### Closed-Case Electronic Calibration

The instrument uses closed-case electronic calibration; no internal mechanical adjustments are required. The instrument calculates correction factors based on reference signals that you apply and stores the correction factors in non-volatile memory. This data is not changed by cycling power, \*RST, or SYSTem:PRESet.

### **Keysight Technologies Calibration Services**

Keysight Technologies offers calibration services using automated calibration systems that enable Keysight to provide calibration at competitive prices. See Types of Service Available for information on contacting Keysight.

#### Calibration Adjustment Interval

The instrument should be calibrated on a regular interval determined by the accuracy requirements of your application. A 1-year interval is adequate for most applications. Accuracy specifications are warranted only if calibration is made at regular calibration intervals. Keysight Technologies never recommends calibration adjustment intervals beyond two years.

#### Calibration is Recommended

Whatever calibration interval you select, Keysight Technologies recommends that complete re-calibration should always be performed at the calibration interval. This ensures that the instrument will remain within specifications for the next calibration interval and provides the best long-term stability. Performance data measured during performance verification tests does not mean that the instrument will remain within these limits unless the calibration adjustments are performed. Use the calibration count to verify that all calibration adjustments have been performed.

#### Time Required for Calibration Adjustment

The instrument can be automatically calibrated under computer control, including complete calibration adjustment procedure and performance verification tests, in less than 30 minutes once the instrument is warmed-up (see Test Considerations).

#### **Automating Calibration Adjustment Procedures**

The calibration procedures demonstrate front panel calibration. You can automate the complete verification and calibration procedures outlined in this manual. You can program the instrument configurations specified for each test over the remote interface. You can then enter read back verification data into a test program and compare the results to the appropriate test limit values.

The instrument must be unsecured to calibrate. See Calibration Security for details.

Refer to the CALibration Subsystem for information on SCPI programming.

### Input Connections

Test connections to the instrument are best accomplished using a Keysight Technologies 34172B calibration short for low-thermal offset measurements and a 34171B DMM connector configured to interface to the calibrator output. Shielded, twisted-pair, PTFE interconnect cables of minimum length are recommended between the calibrator and the multimeter to reduce settling and noise errors. HI and HI Sense should be a twisted pair. LO and LO Sense should be a twisted pair. Cable shields should be earth ground referenced. This configuration is recommended for noise reduction and settling time performance during calibration.

#### Test Considerations

Errors may be induced by AC signals present on the input leads during a self-test. Long test leads can also act as an antenna causing pick-up of AC signals.

For optimum performance:

- Ensure that the calibration ambient temperature (Tcal) is stable and between 18  $^{\circ}$ C and 28  $^{\circ}$ C. Ideally the calibration should be performed at 23  $^{\circ}$ C ±2  $^{\circ}$ C.
- Ensure ambient relative humidity is less than 80%.
- Allow a 90 minute warm-up period with a copper short connected.
- Connect the input cable shields to earth ground. Except where noted in the procedures, connect the calibrator LO source to earth ground at the calibrator. It is important that the LO to earth ground connection be made at only one place in the circuit to avoid ground loops.

Because the instrument is capable of making highly accurate measurements, you must take care to ensure that the calibration standards and test procedures do not introduce additional errors. Ideally, the standards used to verify and adjust the instrument should be an order of magnitude more accurate than each instrument range full scale error specification.

For 2-wire ohms measurements, remove lead resistance by doing a null measurement with the leads shorted or with a precision 4-terminal low thermal short. For offset calibration a 4-terminal low thermal short is required.

# Recommended Test Equipment

The recommended test equipment for the performance verification and calibration is listed below. If the exact instrument is not available, substitute calibration standards of equivalent accuracy.

An alternate method is to use the Keysight  $3458A~8\frac{1}{2}$ -digit Digital Multimeter to measure less accurate, yet stable, sources. The output value measured from the source can be entered into the instrument as the target calibration value.

### Calibration Adjustment Process

The following general procedure is recommended to complete a full calibration adjustment.

- 1. Read Test Considerations.
- 2. Perform the performance verification tests to characterize the instrument (incoming data).
- 3. Unsecure the instrument for calibration (see Calibration Security).
- 4. Perform the calibration procedures (see Calibration Procedures).
- 5. Secure the instrument against calibration (see Calibration Security).
- 6. Note the security code and calibration count in the instrument's maintenance records.
- 7. Perform the performance verification tests to verify the calibration.

# Gain Calibration Adjustment Overview

The ADC and zero calibration adjustment procedure must have been recently performed before beginning gain calibration. Gain calibrations can be made using either the front or rear input (not available on the 34460A) terminals. On the 34461A/65A/70A, make sure the **Front/Rear** switch matches the terminals in use.

Never turn off the instrument during a gain or flatness calibration. This may cause calibration memory for the present function to be lost.

### Gain and Flatness Calibration Adjustment Overview

The instrument stores new flatness correction constants each time this procedure is followed. Flatness constants adjust the DMM for AC Volts and AC current measurements across the usable input frequency band. The flatness constant is computed from the calibration value entered for the calibration command and from measurements made automatically during the calibration procedure.

Calibrations for each range and frequency should be performed in the order shown.

#### Flatness Calibration Considerations

The ADC and zero calibration adjustment procedure must have been recently performed before beginning gain calibration. Flatness calibrations can be made using either the front or the rear input terminals. On the 34461A/65A/70A, make sure the **Front/Rear** switch matches the terminals in use.

Never turn off the instrument during a gain or flatness calibration. This may cause calibration memory for the present function to be lost.

#### Gain Calibration

The instrument calculates and stores gain corrections for each input value. The gain constant is computed from the calibration value entered for the calibration command and from measurements made automatically during the calibration procedure.

Most measurement functions and ranges have gain calibration procedures, and calibration for each function should be performed in the order shown.

### Entering Calibration Values and Storing Calibration Constants

#### Selecting the Calibration Mode

Use the CALibration: ADC? query to begin ADC calibration. The response to this query indicates a successful calibration (0) or a failure (1). Following the ADC calibration, use the measurement commands to set the DMM measurement parameters and functions for the mode being calibrated.

Front Panel: [Utility] > Test/Admin > Calibrate > Perform Cal > Cal Value > Perform ADC Cal

### **Entering Calibration Values**

To enter a calibration value from the remote interface use CALibration: VALue < value > followed by the CALibration? query. The response to the query indicates whether the calibration is valid.

Front Panel: [Utility] > Test/Admin > Calibrate > Perform Cal > Cal Value > (enter value) > Perform Cal Step

### **Storing the Calibration Constants**

To store calibration values in non-volatile memory, use CALibration:STORe.

Front Panel: [Utility] > Test/Admin > Calibrate > Save Cal Values

You must have performed a successful calibration immediately before pressing Save Cal Values.

### Calibration Security

This section describes the instrument's calibration security system. If you forget the security code, you can override calibration security.

### **Security Overview**

A security code (calibration password) prevents accidental or unauthorized instrument calibration.

- When shipped from the factory, the instrument is secured, with the security code (calibration password) set to AT3446XA.
- The same security code must be used for front panel and remote operation. If you secure the instrument from the front panel, use that same code to unsecure it from the remote interface.
- This setting is non-volatile; it will not be changed by power cycling or \*RST or SYSTem:PRESet.
- Security code rules:
   Unquoted string up to 12 characters
   Must start with letter (A-Z)
   May contain letters, numbers (0-9) and underscores
- Front Panel: [Utility] > Test / Admin > Security
- SCPI: CALibration:SECure:STATe

### Calibration Adjustment Procedures

# Calibration Message

You can store a message of up to 40 characters in calibration memory. For example, you could store the date of the last calibration, the date the next calibration is due, or the name and phone number of the person responsible for calibration.

To read the calibration message, press **Utility > Test/Admin > Calibrate** or send **CALibration:STRing?** from the remote interface.

To change the calibration message, unsecure the instrument and press **Utility > Test/Admin > Calibrate** > **Edit Cal String** or send **CALibration:STRing** "<*string*>" from the remote interface.

#### Calibration Count

You can query the instrument to determine how many calibrations have been performed. Because the value increments each time you store the calibration constants, a complete calibration adds many counts. The calibration count also increments whenever you save a calibration string, change the calibration password, or override the calibration security.

Your instrument was calibrated at the factory. When you receive your instrument, be sure to read the count to determine its initial value.

To read the calibration count, press [Utility] > Test/Admin > Calibrate on the front panel or send CALibration:COUNt? from the remote interface. You can read the calibration count regardless of whether the instrument is secured.

# Aborting a Calibration in Progress

Sometimes it may be necessary to abort a calibration. You can abort a calibration at any time on any module by turning off the power or issuing a remote interface device clear message.

CAUTION


If you abort a calibration in progress when the instrument is attempting to write new calibration constants to EEPROM, you may lose all calibration constants for the function. Typically, upon re-applying power, the instrument will report error 705 Cal:Aborted. It may also generate errors 740 through 742. If this occurs, you should not use the instrument until a complete re-calibration has been performed. See the list of calibration errors for more information.

### Security Code Override

The instrument security code (calibration password) is set to AT3446XA at the factory. If it has been changed and you no longer remember the code, you can reset the code back to its factory default value by using one of the two following procedures.

#### Which Procedure Should I Use?

From the instrument front panel, press [Shift] > [Help] > About to view the instrument firmware revision. An example display is:



The last two digits of the firmware revision indicate the front panel PC board revision and which of the two procedures you should use. If the firmware revision ends with 02 or greater, use Procedure A. If the firmware revision ends with 01, use Procedure B.



### Procedure A: For Firmware Revision Ending in 02, or Greater

WARNING

This procedure should be performed by qualified service personnel only. Turn off the power and remove all measurement leads and other cables, including the power cord, from the instrument before continuing.

- 1. Follow the disassembly procedure to disassemble the instrument.
- 2. Locate connector J102 on the front panel board. Short pin A1 to B1 as shown by the orange line below.



- 3. Reassemble the instrument, apply power and turn it on; the instrument will generate an error and beep (this is normal). Wait 30 to 40 seconds for the instrument to power up completely.
- 4. Reset the security code to the factory default:
  - a. Press [Shift] > [Utility] > Test / Admin > Security > New Code.



Configuration: DC Voltage

- 1. Configure each function and range in the order shown in the table below.
- 2. Apply the input signal shown in the Input column.
- 3. Enter the actual applied input voltage amplitude (see Entering Calibration Values). A Calibration Step Succeeded message indicates success; if the display shows Calibration Step Failed, check the input value, range, function, and entered calibration value and repeat the calibration step.
- 4. Repeat steps 1 through 3 for each gain calibration point shown in the table.

This procedure adjusts the gain for the 2-wire and 4-wire Ohms functions, and the offset compensated Ohms function.

- 3. Enter the actual applied input resistance (see Entering Calibration Values). A Calibration Step Succeeded message indicates success; if the display shows Calibration Step Failed, check the input value, range, function, and entered calibration value and repeat the calibration step.
- 4. Repeat steps 1 through 3 for each gain calibration point shown in the table.
- 5. Store the new calibration constants (see Storing the Calibration Constants).

### AC Current 10 A Gain Calibration

This calibration procedure applies to the 34461A, 34465A, and 34470A only (not applicable to the 34460A).

Review Test Considerations and Flatness Calibration Considerations before performing any calibration.

Configuration: AC Current

All AC calibration procedures use the 3 Hz bandwidth measurement filter.

- 1. Select the 10 A range.
- 2. Apply the 5 A input signal at 1000 Hz.
- 3. Enter the actual applied input current as the Cal Value (see Entering Calibration Values). A Calibration Step Succeeded message indicates success; if the display shows Calibration Step Failed, check the input value, range, function, and entered calibration value and repeat the calibration step.
- 4. Store the new calibration constants (see Storing the Calibration Constants).

NOTE

This calibration takes approximately 2.5 seconds to complete.



#### DC Current 10 A Gain Calibration

This calibration procedure applies to the 34461A, 34465A, and 34470A only (not applicable to the 34460A).

Review Test Considerations and Flatness Calibration Considerations before performing any calibration.

Configuration: DC Current

- 1. Configure the 10 A range and set the integration time to 100 PLC.
- 2. Apply the 5 A input.
- 3. Enter the actual applied input current as the Cal Value (see Entering Calibration Values). A Calibration Step Succeeded message indicates success; if the display shows Calibration Step Failed, check the input value, range, function, and entered calibration value and repeat the calibration step.
- 4. Store the new calibration constants (see Storing the Calibration Constants).

This calibration takes less than 4 seconds to complete.



### Capacitance Offset Calibration (Optional)

This calibration procedure applies to all models (34460A/61A/65A/70A).

This calibration is normally not required. It compensates for residual capacitance offset which is typically less than a few pF. In normal use, any residual offset will be overridden by the null function (null also corrects for cable capacitance), and the null function is required to achieve the multimeter's capacitance specification.

Configuration: Capacitance

- 1. Remove all connections from the instrument's front terminals.
- 2. Select the front terminals.
- 3. Enter a calibration value of +0 (see Entering Calibration Values). A Calibration Step Succeeded message indicates success; if the display shows Calibration Step Failed, check the input value, range, function, and entered calibration value and repeat the calibration step.
- 4. Repeat steps 1 through 3 for the instrument's rear terminals (not applicable to the 34460A).
- 5. Store the new calibration constants (see Storing the Calibration Constants).

# Finishing Calibration

To finish calibrating your instrument:

- 1. Remove all shorting blocks and connections from the instrument.
- 2. Reset the calibration message.
- 3. Secure the instrument with the calibration password.
- 4. Record the new calibration count.
- 5. Perform the performance verification tests to verify the calibration.

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
